Butter Making Room Changed-A New 400 Galion Cylinder and Other Apparatus-Commodious Refrigerator-Cheese Making Department Enlarged-Other Changes-Prospects For Season Are

The buildings have been enlarged and remodel. to the body that it is able to led in the most convenient manner and

are now complete in every respect. The old butter making room is now devoted to the separating process entirely, the butter making being carried on in an adjoining room, separated by a half glass partition. By this provision it is possible for an instructor to observe all that transpiring in both rooms. Another advantage lies in the fact that it is possible to obtain any degree of temperature desired in either room. While the separating room is only 20x22 feet in size, that devoted to butter making is twenty five feet equare, thus giving more space in which to work, and affording more accommodation

tostudents. Besides the two already in position, a third Alexandra separator has been added, while in the butter-making room new 400 gallon cylinder combined churn dence, 189 Johnston street. Good locality, and butter maker has been placed in position, in addition to the 250 gallon square churn formerly used. Besides these there is a regular butter-making machine, a new oil test churn and cream gatherer, and also a Pasteurizing apparatus for heating milk for the purpose of destroying any objec-

tionable odor, and at the same time obtain

any desired flavor.

In rear of the butter-making room is a cooling room, a commodious refrigerator, and adjoining them a store room. The refrigerator is the most perfect that can be built, the walls, floor and ceiling being scientifically constructed so as to yeld the Union Street, near Division Street, lately very best results. Ice. plentifully eprinkled with salt, is stored in galvanized iron cylinders, and by this method it is possible to obtain zero point. It is fitted with electric lights, and is closed by a perfectly air tight door.

The cooling room contains tiers of shelves and is so fitted up that any degree of temperature may be obtained. The adjoining room is devoted to the storage of stock and supplies. The boiler room is more commodious and convenient than hitherto.

A direct passage leads to the boiler room from the rooms devoted to both cheese and butter making, situated at opposite ende of the building. The old curing room has been converted into a press room, a portion being partioned off for a temporary store room. The cheese making department has been greatly enlarged, allowing greater facility for the carrying on of this important work.

Three curing rooms are adjacent to the press room. Each one is distinct and separate from the others, the object being to make it possible to control the temperatures for the purpose of carrying on experiments in curing at different degrees. Each room is heated and ventilated separately and contains an apparatus for controlling moisture, as well as a self registering maximum and minimum thermometer, and a hygrometer for registering the degree of moisture in each compartment The milk testing room has been enlarged by 6 x 22 feet, new tables and additional apparatus being placed therein.

After completing all the work it is found that a balance of the appropriation set aside for the purpose, is left, a guarantee that the improvements have been carried on economically. Prospects for the coming season are indeed bright. The number of students already registered exceeds al previous seasons. When the school opens, students from Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Minnesota, north-west territories Wisconsin and Ontario will be in attendance. Some are expected from New York etate and Vermont.
