Mate Leroy Reveals a Secret of Skirt Construction-Tailor Made Gowns More Popular Than Ever Before-The Materials Employed-The Season's Wraps.

Every day sees some new goods, or rather some new combination of color or textile, with a new name. Just now the principal displays are of stuffs for street wear and silks for home and evening gowns. The silks are of every variety, it seems to me, that has been made or even dreamed of sincothe days of Solomon. We find the crisp and glossy taffetas, in light weights and new colors. There are changeable silks and every imaginable plaid, print or brocade under the sun. There are novelties comprising Scotch tartans and pretty ones, too, and turtans with a rich and well defined moire design over the surface. Matelasse, brocatelle plumetis, bayaderes where the design is straight, notched or undulated, and of satin or velvet woven in pompadour stripes, are made up for elegant reception gowns. These are in the pretty though rather babyish colors made

so famous in the days of Pompadour. There are superb brocades in two and three shades of the pearliest and silveriest gray that gleams and glistens whitely under the gaslight. These brocades have exceedingly large designs more in arabesques than floral, though sometimes one finds a large flower exaggerated to immense size, with leaves a foot or more long. The pompadour silks have pale pink or faint blue stripes 6 inches wide, and these are moire. The stripe is of the contrasting colos, like pink on blue, or vice versa, and is but a couple of inches wide. This in turn is overrun with little flowers like resoluds, with their green leaves, all in miniature and exquisitely perfect.

I noticed particularly a superb gown of deep petunia velvet intended to be worn at a fastfionable wedding. This was cut princess form and fitted as though grown for the lady in question. There was a deep train formed by the natural folds of the princess back. This train had three lines of the narrow featherbone sewed in, and I think I never saw a richer, more queenly effect than the heavy rolls gave. They moved with the wearer's movements, but always fell back into the same rich grace.

But I was going to say more about the tailor made gewns. They will be worn more generally this fall and winter than they have been for some years. There is one class made with a skirt and reefer, another with tight fitting waists or basques half long and very plain in themselves, and others with the curious anomaly a tailor made blouse. To those where there is a tight waist only a provision is made to have a chamols skin undervest, or to have a cape made of the same stuff as that in the gown. The various styles of tallor suits may be summed up as follows: Meltonette and cheviots in all the season's colors are made with fly front recters. These are lined with silk or satin in good quality and in color proper for the outside. Fine Scotch cheviots are made with tight fitting waists, sometimes plain and sometimes braided in military or other design. English kerseys are generally made with strapped seams and lined with thick faille or rhadame silk. Velvet collars and sometimes cuffs are added to these. The coats have fly fronts and reefer effects, and the skirts are plain, but exquisitely made and the bottoms slightly

stiffened with featherbone. Scotch cheviot, English kersey and beaver are all employed to make these elegant tallor gowns, although the two last named are a bit heavy. Still they are so very fine that one forgets the weight. Covert cloth is also used for elegant tallor gowns, and, last, but by no means least, the fine broadcloths. wherever they meet him. It has only been within recent years that the federal government has assumed direct control of the quarantine. In 1892, when a cholera steamer lay in New York harbor and threatened to spread the plague all over the country, the national marine hospital service officials found the local health officer unwilling to share his responsibility with the federal agents. The situation was too grave, however, to allow one man to endanger the health of the nation, and without law or authority the federal agents took command and fought back the plague. The next year congress put all local quarantine stations under the control of the national bureau, and since then the system has been enlarged and improved.

The national health officers step in only in cases of great danger, but when they do organize to fight disease they assume despotic control. Their first effort is to localize the epidemic, to shut it off from the rest of the country To do this they put guards around whole towns and order all the inhabitants into detention camps. In such cities as New Orleans and Mobile the United States marine hospital is equipped for almost any emergency of this kind that may arise, and at all stations are plans for the erection of quarantine camps on a large scale. This service, while insignificant as compared with many other national bureaus in size and cost, is pernaps more important to our welfare than either our army or our navy and in proportion to the number of men in the ranks includes more real heroes than both of them put together. 
