This college being the only purely governmental educational institution conducted by the dominion authorities it should be regarded with insmartness and esprit de corps observable.



Only the Alaska Commercial company is allowed to kill seals on these islands, and the government receives for this privilege \$55,000 a year, besides a royalty of \$2.62 on each skin taken. Further than

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 28 -Apoplexy yesterday carried off Dr. Alexander Milton Ross, of Montreal, at the home of his son, Dr. Norman G. Ross, 79 Bagg street, this city. Dr. Ross was on his way south for his health, having been ill, and had spent two weeks in Detroit when death came. Dr. Ross had a long line of famous ancestry on both sides of his house, was splendidly educated, a valuable Canadian assistant to president Abraham Lincoln during the civil war, was a surgeon in the full of Maximillian, a famous naturalist, member of a score of scientific associations, had received the honors of knighthood from several foreign rulers and medals from several governments. He held several college degrees and was the author of a large number of scientific 1864 works which are considered standard. 
