CAREER ENDED

CONVICT BUCKLEY BREATHES

HIS LAST. he Way of the Transgressor is Hard-Criminal From His Boyhood-Grew Desperate With Long Continement-Attempted Escape-Gave Much Trouble

To the Guards. The death of convict Buckley at the Kingston penitentiary yesterday wiped out the career of one of the greatest scoundrels that ever entered within the prison walls. "Buck" was a bye-word with his notorious comrades. During his incarceration the animal nature in him showed itself very prominently, much to the inconvenience of those in charge and endangering perfect discipline among his fellow convicts. The severest measures had to be resorted to several times quell the inherent evil in him. No punishment, however, could effectively annihilate that' spirit, and his life truly exemplified the truth, the way of the transgressor is hard, and that excessive indulgence in sin shortens the way to the grave. Yesterday morning at 7:30 o'clock his soul departed to meet the author of its existence.

Very little can be ascertained concerning Buckley's earlier life. His criminal career, however, commenced while he was still in tender age. Petty thefts and misdemeanors brought him before the notice of the officers of peace, and previous to his last imprisonment he had served short terms. His last offence was committed lin the city of Toronto, when he, in a drunken fit of temper threw a woman down stairs, causing her death. That woman had been keeping house with him, and both being under the influence of liquor, one night engaged in a quarrel, with the above result. For the crime the judge sentenced him to five years in the penitentiary. Thelight penalty aroused the ire of the Toronto people and their indignation became so marked that the judge was forced to recall his decision and increased the term to fif teen years. He entered the Kingston peni tentiary on Oct. 10th, 1888. Buckley's counsel at the time promised to intercede for his release at the end of five years, and explained Buckley's good behavior at the institution during that period. But at the end of the five years such step being taken the expectant convict became careless, obstinate and almost desperate. His conduct caused endless trouble for the guards, and solitary confinement was common punishment for him. His greatest act of desperation was committed in the summer of 1896, when he combined his efforts with four other
