HOLD SPECIAL MEETINGS.

DWIGHT L. MOODY EN ROUTE TO WINNIPEG.

An Old Retail House Assigned—Died From Carbolic Acid Poisoning—Administered Also to the Babe—A Visit of a Politician.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 2.—D. L. Moody, the famous evangelist, passed through the city this morning on his way to Winnipeg where he will hold a series of meetings.

Mrs. Mary Jasko, a fashionably dressed woman of twenty-six years, residing at 2,861 St. Catharines street, was taken to the Notre Dame hospital this morning in an ambulance. She died two hours later of carbolic acid poisoning, probably self-administered. Her lips were terribly burned. The lips of her two-year-old babe, which still lives, tell a similar tale. The woman belongs to Montreal.

Gen. Russell A. Alger, secretary of war in the McKinley cabinet, arrived today on the private business. He paid an informal visit to the United States warship Yantic now here on her way to Detroit.

Messrs. Dufresne and Monganais, the oldest retail grocers in Montreal, assigned today at the instance of Messrs. Hudon, Hebert & Co. No statement has yet been issued, but the liabilities are stated to be large.

A Kingston Lady Married. On Friday last Mrs. M. A. Roblin, manager of the Kingston corset factory, Princess street was quietly married to Dr. A. J. McDougall of Columbus, Ohio, at Cape Vincent by the Rev. Mr. Cheesman. The wedding was hastily arranged, as the bride and groom had been in the city for a few days only, and the intention of the contracting parties to withhold the ceremony until the first of the year but Dr. MacDougall having to pass this way on route for Montreal on professional business, requested his affianced to consent to an immediate marriage. Dr. MacDougall is a Canadian, having been born at Lancaster, and a graduate of McGill college. For the past fifteen years he has practiced in Columbus, Ohio, and up to the close of last year carried on a large medical depot under his own name, manufacturing several medicines for various diseases. He is well known throughout the states as a medical specialist. His manufactory was destroyed by fire last January, and since then he has represented another medical firm. His engagement closes at the end of the present year, and after that Dr. and Mrs. MacDougall will reside in St. Louis, Mo., where the doctor will continue his practice.

Bold Attempt For Liberty. While the convicted man, Misner, was coming down on the train last night from St. Catharines to enter the Kingston penitentiary, he made an attempt to jump out of the car window but was caught by sheriff G. Whistler. Misner, the sheriff claims, is the most troublesome prisoner he ever had in charge. A continual watch had to be kept on him, for he was on the alert for chances of escape. He played the old game of frequent visits to the lavatory and it was through the window of that apartment he endeavored to throw himself. Misner was arrested at Niagara-on-the-Lake for burglary and sentenced to three years' servitude in the penitentiary.

We are to pursue any other course than the one he has taken he would be a perjurer to the sacred oaths of his church. To our mind the manly, open, anti-hypocritical course of his grace seems deserving of all praise."

Tenders for receiving and drawing broken stone were supplied but no action taken. Sundry accounts were signed for payment and then the council adjourned to meet on Dec. 15th.

A Veteran Dead. LONDON, Nov. 2.—Colonel John Rouso Merritt, of the 1st Life Guards, the hero of the famous defence of Rorke's Drift, South Africa, in January, 1879, died at Tisbury yesterday evening. He was born in 1804 and obtained his commission in the Royal engineers in 1828.

Death Of A Geographer. LONDON, Nov. 2.—Sir Rutherford Alcock, K.C.B., who in 1876 was president of the Royal geographical society, and who in 1882 presided over the health department of the special science congress, is dead.

TO PROHIBIT FOOTBALL.

Van Gannon's Death May Lead to Legislative Action in Georgia.

ATLANTA, Nov. 2.—As a result of the fatal injuries received by Van Gannon of the university of Georgia football team in the game Saturday, the team will probably be disbanded.

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THE DEATH CHAIR CREATED.

A MAN SHOOTS THE GIRL WHO SUPPORTED HIM.

Then He Put a Bullet Through His Own Brain—The Wages of Sin, Says the Old Book, is Death, and How True?

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Kate Margert, a German girl, twenty years old, employed as a cook in the family of Ernest Syriax, at 219 East 71st street, this city, was murdered last night by her common law husband, Adolph Meyer. Within half an hour after the assassination Meyer shot and killed himself while in his boarding house on East 74th street. The cook was slain in the basement of the house where she was employed. She was washing some clothes when the fatal shot was fired at her by Meyer.

They had lived together for some time and their child had died. The young woman was soon to become a mother again. Meyer, a shiftless sort of a fellow, had been supported by the cook's earnings. Asked by an acquaintance as to how he managed to live without working, Meyer is said to have replied: "I get it from the girls."

When he called upon the cook last evening he demanded money. She had none to give and then Meyer, becoming angry, drew a revolver and fired three shots, one of which took effect and caused death. After the shooting Meyer ran from the scene of the crime, and, going direct to his boarding house, committed suicide. He was thirty-five years of age.

As each one waked from a nap; But the dear wee woman hid her face For shame in her mother's lap.

The Case Taken Up. OTTAWA, Nov. 2.—The supreme court met today, there being on the bench Sir Henry Strong, chief justice, and justices Tachereau, Gwynne, King and Sedgewick. The appeal in the arbitration case between the dominion and the provinces of Quebec and Ontario was taken up. This appeal is in regard to the common school fund and lands.

Mr. Trenholme moved that Ontario appeal against liability for part of the common school fund be quashed. This was argued by Trenholme for and Blake against. Judgment was reserved on this point, after which the merits of the case were discussed.

And This in Toronto the Good! TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 2.—Dr. Sheard, city medical health officer, this morning presented a report to the board of health showing that no less than 500 illegitimate children are born in Toronto yearly. A very considerable number of these children are disposed of within twenty-four hours after birth and before they have been seen by the mother. They are sent to public institutions in Montreal and Ottawa, which are said to be constantly looking for children which cannot be identified forward by parents. Dr. Sheard suggests that such a system be established by which parents of such children are enabled to keep acquainted with their welfare.

Asking For Help. TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 2.—The residence of Dr. Kennedy, law clerk of the Ontario legislature, was visited by burglars last night and many articles of value taken. At a meeting of the Toronto police force this morning a resolution was passed expressing deep regret at the disasters by bush fires in the eastern townships, especially the destruction of two Presbyterian churches, and directing the attention of the church to the necessities of the district.

An illuminated address of congratulation to having celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of his ordination was presented to Rev. Dr. Gregg.

Roman Catholic Priest Apprehended. NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—A man believed to have been a priest of the Roman Catholic church was found dead Monday in the Central hotel, 201 East 116th street. The gas was fully turned on, the door and windows closed, the body, undressed, was partly under the bed. There were no letters or statements left behind, but in his pockets were found several envelopes. They contained bills which were addressed to Rev. Father W. Thomas Stack. There has been an Italian priest in Harlem lately. He was known as Stack and also as O'Brien.

Fat Policemen Must Go. ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Nov. 2.—There is consternation in the police department over the decision of the board that all fat men must go. Some of the officers affected by the order have been on the force a dozen years, but it is said their weight would handicap them in chasing thieves or dealing with rioters.

Another Sudden Death. OREGON, N.Y., Nov. 2.—Mayor Henry McCaffery, president of the city department of public works, an extensive contractor in telegraph and telephone construction, died suddenly at his home in this city this morning of heart failure. He enjoyed an extensive acquaintance in business circles in the United States and Canada.

Got Away With \$300. HALIFAX, N.S., Nov. 2.—A burglary is reported from Shediac, N. B. Joseph Gault, hotelkeeper, at that place, had \$300 in a trunk in his bedroom. On Sunday the room was entered and the cash stolen. The police are on the track of the robber.

BRADFORD, Ont., Nov. 2.—This morning about three o'clock the handsome brick residence, with the most of the contents, belonging to John Rogers, of this place, was totally destroyed by fire. It is supposed that the fire originated from a defective flue. Loss about \$6,000, with some insurance.

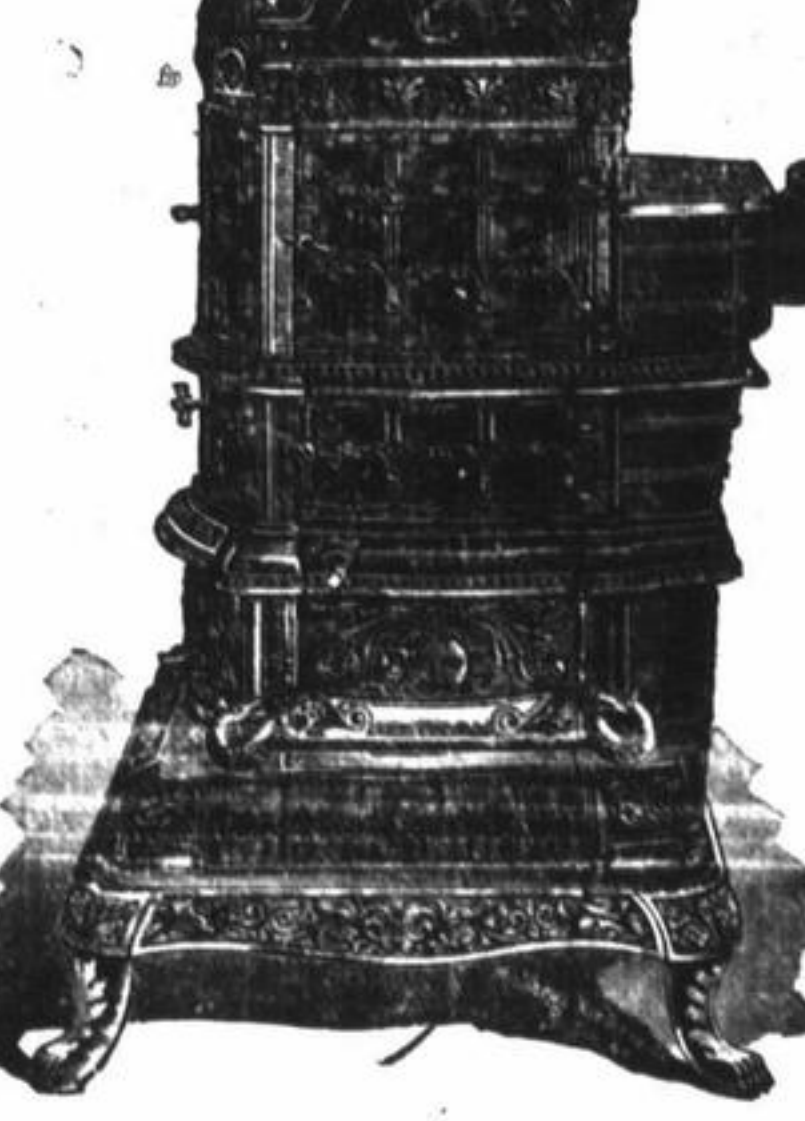
