A Noted Canadian Dead In Detroit,

DETROIT, Nov. 2 - Daniel K. Winder, a typical figure in Detroit, known as the "Old Astronomer," died yesterday. In 1861 Mr. Winder became pastor of the Church of the Disciples in Cleveland, occuping that pulpit two years, when he re- Meyer. moved to Toronto, where he busied himself for some years in scientific researches, and constructed some scientific instructions of much value. In 1867 he was elected president of the Toronto astronomical society, and since 1889 he has been a corresponding member of that body. In 1871, after several years of scientific work on "The Mushrooms of Canada," which ran through two editions. He was for some time a special lecturer in the Ontario dental college, and for seven years assistant chaplain of the provincial lunatic asylum at Toronto. In 1877 he was elected first vice president of Toronto entomological society. In 1879 he came to Detroit, and has resided here ever since. In 1892 he published a work entitled, "Positive Proofs of a Future life," of which two editions were issued.

Lumbermen Coming Into Canada. BAY CITY, Mich., Nov. 2.—Lumbermen in this citylare making preparations to conduct active operations in the woods this winter. Canada is the objective point of many, despite the threatened retaliation of the dominion government on account of the lumber tariff, and the largest part of the timber will be brought here for sawing. There are already indications that every mill in Bay City will run to its full capacity from the beginning to the end of next season. There was a large increase in the lumber shipments from Bay City during October, as compared with the same month last year, indicating a healthy growth in the lumber trade. The shipments during the month were nearly 13,000,000 feet compared with less than 6,000,000 feet in October last year.


