



But (alas for my brother, cardinal Newman!) Catholics must always be false lights and real foes to the outstanding churches. I have a word to say as to the cause of weakness to these last in a world-wide view. Forgive an egotistic word, to explain faithfully my own position. I am not able to communicate with any christian church; but my difference is not moral or spiritual, but historical. My age is past eighty-four At the childish age of eleven my earnest religion began. 


