

The Funeral To-Day.




'Tis Only A Dream,

LONDON, Nov. 15. - The afternoon papers devote editorial articles to the visit of Sir W. Laurier, the premier of Canada, to Washington. Spanish Train Blown Up.

HAVANA, Nov. 15 -A train running between the seaport of Nuevitas and the city of Puerto Principe was derailed on Saturday by the explosion of a dynamite bomb placed on the tracks by insurgents. The train was going at full speed when the explosion took place. The armored car was shattered. Ten persons were killed and twenty five seriously wounded, almost all Spanish soldiers. The engineer is among the killed. The bodies of the killed were mangled beyond the possibility of identification, and the wounds of those still living are of the most dreadful character.

THE WORLD'S GRAIN CROP. The Aggregate Production Falls Short Of The kequirements,

LONDON, Nov. 15 -According to Mr. Broomball, the statistican of the English available. His annual statement of the world's resources has just been issued. Mr. Broomball says that the European crops amount to 140,000,000 quarters, compared with 185,000,000 last year. The deficiency, compared with the so-called famine year of 1891, is 10,000,000 quar-

North and South America, he reckons, produced 95,000,000 quarters of wheat; United States 73,000,000,as compared with 101 000,000 last year, Asia, Africa and Australia has reckoned somewhat in excess of last year, but fully 11,000,000 less than in 1891. The world's production this year, is 278,000,000 quarters, compared with 298,000,000 in 1896 and 308,000, in 1891. The reserves risible in Europe. the United States, and Canada amount to 10,000,000 quarters, as compared with 15, 000,000 in 1896. Thus the aggregate production and reserves fall 25,000,000 short of the estimated requirements of the current season, 316,000,000 or 28,000,000 in excess of the total production and reserves. The conclusion is that nothing but a plenteous yield in Argentina in the coming harvest can prevent an absolute


