MAY COME TO MONTREAL.

PROF. SNIDER, CAMBRIDGE, ENG., MAY ASSUME CHARGE.

United States Sailors Arrested for Drunkenness—Got a Month in Jail—Twelve Englishmen Going to the Klondyke—Jury Returns Their Verdict.

MONTREAL, Nov. 15.—The name of Prof. Snyder, Cambridge, England, and formerly of Trinity college, Toronto, is mentioned as the probable successor to the late Rev. Canon Henderson, as principal of the Montreal diocesan theological college.

Leucyur, alias Grames, a penitentiary bird who attempted to commit suicide in superintendent Carpenter's office Saturday, was to-day sent to jail for one month on a charge of carrying a loaded weapon.

Two sailors of the United States warship Yantic were before the recorder to-day on a charge of drunkenness. They were allowed to go, after promising to drink no more during their stay in port.

Twelve fantastically dressed young Englishmen, all wearing soubriens and carrying numerous weapons, have arrived here on their way to Klondyke. The jury in the case of Norman Mitchell, who shot himself Friday night, after having been rejected by Miss Mann, returned a verdict of suicide with view of amounting to a crime.

A prominent citizen of Montreal has passed away in the person of Frederick Fairman, president of the Dominion bar wire company, whose death from pneumonia is announced. The deceased, who was in his fifty-ninth year, was a former resident of Gananoque, and a prominent Methodist.
