SANDBAGGED, STABBED

Victim Likely To Die of Injuries He Received.

FOLLOWED HIM FROM BANK

HIGHWAYMEN FELL ON HIM AND TOOK \$500.

Stabbed Stewart Paisley, of Mount Albert In Fifteen Places With a Knife - Was To Have Heen Married-He Thinks He Could Recognize tils Assailants Will

Seek Their Arrest. TORONTO, Nov. 17 .- High constable Jones yesterday dispatched county constables Burns, Boyd and McInwain to Mount Albert to investigate the attack upon Stewart Paisley, who was assaulted, robbed and severely injured in the main street of the village.

Pairley, who was to have been married yesterdsy, drove into Stouffville on Monday and drew nearly \$600 from the Standard bank. He returned to Mount Albert, and after writing a couple of letters, went to post them. Half an hour later he was found, bleeding and unconscious, with about a dozen wounds in his body and two or three in his head. Under Dr. Forrest's care he recovered consciousness and told the following story:

He was followed from Stouffville by three men in a buggy, from whom he drove away. When going to the post office after returning home these men passed him He posted his letters and was near home when they again drove past him. A moment later be heard a step behind him and saw two of the men, the other being it the buggy. He received a blow from a club which felled him, while he grappled with one assailant, dragging him down Then the other man kicked him in the fage, and both men attacked him with knives. He also received blows on the head with a club, and finally became un conscious. He thinks that he could recognize the assailants, but they will have to be captured soon, as Paisley is in a very seri ous condition.

MOUNT ALBERT, Ont., Nov. 17 .- The condition of Stewart, who on Monday night was sand bagged, stabbed and robbed of between \$500 and \$600, which he had just drawn from the Standard bank in Stouffville, is worse this morning. He is raving considerably and ap pears to think the robbers are still at him. He will have a hard task to pull through. Nothing has been learned as vet as to who the robbers were. Detective Burns, of Toronto, is working hard on the case. A reward is offered for any information which will lead to the detec tion and the arrest of the robbers.

BIDDEFORD, Maine, Nov. 17.-Jean Baptiste Guillemet, aged seventeen, rested in connection with the murder of his uncle, Mr. Laplante, at Liboire, P. Q. Ocs. 30th, has confessed that he committed the crime and declared it was at the instigation of the wife of the married man, who promised to marry him after the death of his uncle.

Guillemet states that he went to St. Liboirs about the first of October to visit his uncle and aunt. He says that for two weeks before the murder, his aunt was constantly urging him to get rid of his

Marrying Veterans for the Pensions Given

Touts, Me., Nov. 16 .- The large colony of women who have come to Hallowell and Gardner to prey upon the inmates the Soldiers' Home at this lace are in a state of panic over the recent suggestion of pension commissioner Evans, who has recommended to congress that no pensions be granted the widows of soldiers who are married here-

Many veterans who live at the home are trapped into marriage every year by women who seek the twelve dollars a month pension which will come to them on the death of their husbands. Most of these women have had reputations and no character. Having led gay lives in the cities until their beauty is gone, they seek marriage with the old soldiers for the solo purpose of inheriting pensions. After cap turing husbands most of the women go back to the cities and cause no more trouble until death carries off the veterans

and the widows' pensions may be obtained There are a dozen places near the home, all of which do a thriving business by luring the veterans inside and filling them up with liquor until they fall an easy prey to the women who are waiting for husbands. In case a man refuses to drink and shows resistance he is quieted with a club, or anything else that comes handy. spring an inmate of the home was killed
