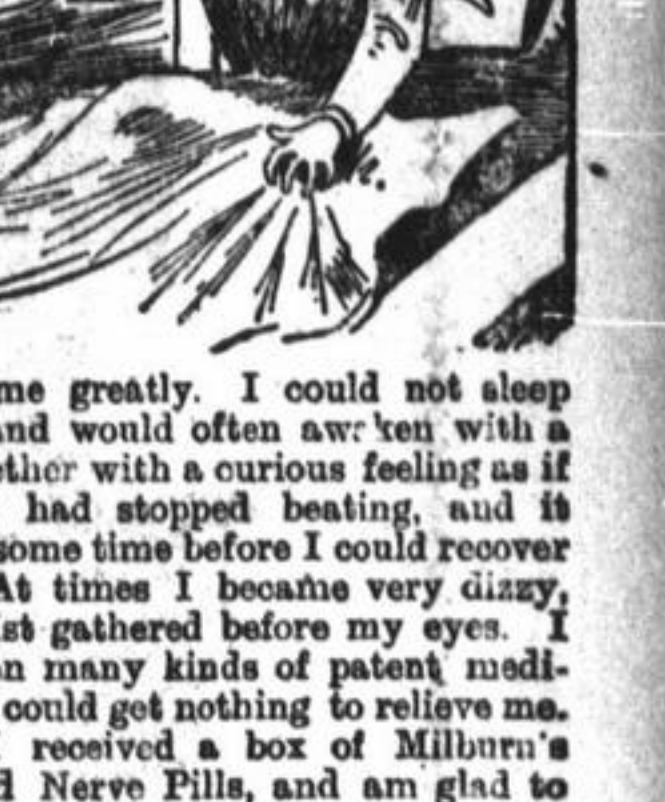
The Gillies Bros. Co. has determined to build its new cedar mill at Black Point, on the Chats lake. The new mill will cut about 250,000 shingles per day.
