LESSON TO THE CHURCHES.

The Christian Alliance, to which Rev. Dr. Wilson, formerly of Kingston, has been for some time attached, is showing the denominations an example in missionary enterprise. The alliance has messengers in China, Japan, India, Egypt, Africa, Sweden, South America, and was pushing out and aiming at the work of evangelization of the world over. The feature the movement is its "interdenominational, international, spiritual and economical character." The allowances to missionaries are exceedingly small. That one matter will not be in very much evidence in this campaign. Mr. Howland will have to do better in order to convince the electors that they ought to elect him in preference to Mr. Bertram, who is a large employer of labor, a progressive business man, and a supporter of a government that has done so much in so short a time to develop the trade and commerce

It has been said that Mr. Bertram is in favor of a stable tariff, and curiosity has been aroused as to what he means by that. His mind may be inferred from what he said at a meeting on Saturday night, a speech in which he intimated that he had been consulted by the finance minister in regard to the tariff, that he had to do with it as it now stood, and that it, therefore, met his entire approval. "I care nothing," he said, "about theoretical politicians; we want the people who bring trade to the country, and the liberal party is doing that." We understand the Kingston & Pembroke railway connection will be made opposite the city buildings. Surely the city can arrange with the K. & P. railway to con-Trunk railway there. Referring to the agreements, Ald. Mc-Kelvey said the city should have a bond from the railway company, providing for indemnity in case of a suit for damages. 
