SOME INTERESTING STATISTICS.

Contained in The Report of The English Postmaster-general.

The annual report of the English post master-general for the year ending March 31st, did not appear until the latter end of October. Though it is now almost a matter of ancient history, it contains some interesting and valuable information. The most important step taken during the year was undoubtedly the acquisition of trunk telephone wires. The report does not give us any detailed account of the business transacted over the government lines, but it is interesting to learn that the total mileage of trunk wires now under control of the government exceeds by nearly 4,000 the mileage of wires transferred by the old telegraph companies in Of the total of 52,000 miles of wire 29,000 were bought of the National company, and the remainder bave been erected anew by the post office. The number of telegrams rose to nearly half a million over last year-a notable increase when it is remembered that in the previous period there was a general election and a period of exceptionally active speculation in South African securities.

The number of telegrams now sent (nearly seventy-nine millions and a half, or more than a million and a half every week) exceeds by two millions the number of paid letters passing through the post when the queen came to the throne, while the number of paid letters have risan from

seventy-seven to 1,800 millions. From the last international statistics it appeared that the united kingdom stood dian artillery, Quebec, died of pneumonia second only to New South Wales, heading head, nearly doubling the record of Germany, and trebling that of France. The number per person has increased by more than three per head since 1892, and it may be assumed, therefore, that Great Britain has maintained her place.



Less Disease Than Usual Among Live Stock is Reported-Yield of the Grains-Condition of Fruit and Fruit Trees-Area and Yield of the Crops-Potato Crop Not Very Large.

TORONTO, Nov. 24.—This is a summary issued by the Ontario department of agri-The yield of fall wheat has been large,

is not up to the standard in either weight or quality, as some of the grain "sprouted" during the wet barvest weather. A large area of new fall wheat has been sown, but owing to the dry condition of the soil much of the seeding was done later than usual. Spring wheat was rather poor in the west, but good in the remainder of the province, although much shrunken grain is reported in some quarters. Rye and buckwheat are evidently being restored to favor, and both were splendid crops this year. Peas have been a great disappointment. A tew had good returns, but the yields generally were light, and there are many small peas. The "bug" was unusually destructive. It was one of the worst years for our fancy pea growers. Reports regarding clover sced are, on the whole, unfavorable. The midge was very active. Young clover, however, looks promising. Corn was a splendid yield, but some got nipped by

Potatoes were struck by a blight or rot he September, nearly all the older sections of the province suffering. In some places about fifty per cent. of the crop was lost. Since being taken up, however, the rot has been stayed. The beetle was freely at work, and many small potatoes will be the result. Turnips are fair in yield, but are not so good in quality. Mangel wurzels have done well both in yield and quality. The yield of carrots has been good, but this crop does not seem to be increasing in


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
