HE STILL LOVES IRELAND.

LETTER READ IN DUBLIN WRITTEN BY GLADSTONE. An Attempt Made To Rob A Bank and The Suicide of a Burglar—Marriage of An Indian Prince To An English Lady.

LONDON, Nov. 27.—At a public meeting in Dublin, on Wednesday last, Lord Dufferin presiding, in commemoration of the centenary of Edmund Burke, a letter from Mr. Gladstone was read, in which the veteran statesman said: "I regard Burke, as to Ireland and America, with fervent and unstinted admiration; as to France and the revolution, with grief; but throughout, with the reverence due to a noble combination of character and genius."

A despatch to the Times from Cape Town describes a bold attempt to rob the Standard bank at Claremont, a suburb of Cape Town. A masked man entered the counting-room of the bank, locked the door and by some unknown means broke the neck of the cashier, though no violence could be found on the body. When the manager of the bank appeared the robber fired and wounded him slightly. The police then rushed in, and the robber, seeing that all chance of escape was gone, shot himself dead.

The doubts raised as to whether an English aristocrat was permitted to marry an Indian have been dispelled by the announcement that Lady Ann Coventry and Prince Nub Singh are to be married on December 29th. The Coventrys are opposed to the union, but their objections have been over-ruled, and the Indian government has agreed to settle upon the bride the sum of \$10,000 annually.

The Welsh steamer Labarovero, of Cardiff, has foundered off Trevas Head as the result of a collision with an unknown vessel. Her crew of twelve has been landed at Cardiff, after being in an open boat for twenty-four hours. There was a large and fashionable attendance at St. Margaret's church, Westminster, this afternoon to witness the marriage of lord Mount Stephen to Miss Gina Tarnell, a lady-in-waiting to the late duchess of Teck.

There was no formal reception. Lord and lady Mount Stephen left for the continent this afternoon. Upon their return to London they will take up their residence at Brocke hall. Woes of a Court Physician. Being physician to an Asiatic ruler carries a good salary with it, but it has its disadvantages. News comes from Persia of the death of Sir Joseph Tholozan, physician to the shah. For 30 years Sir Joseph was the physician and trusted confidant of the Shah Nasr-ed-Din. When that ruler died and his son, the present shah, ascended the throne, Sir Joseph was not a friend in Paris saying that he was going to resign his post, as he was afraid of his life. It would appear that his fears were only too well founded. Sir Joseph was acquainted with many of the secrets of the court, and his death was desired on that account by the new shah. His predecessor at the Persian court is said to have been done away with for the same reasons.

Counterfeiting In Prison. Fine specimens of counterfeit money circulated near Pittsburg have been found to come from within the walls of Riverside penitentiary. Warden Wright, who had been complimented recently for keeping the model prison institution of this country, found within the gray walls a complete counterfeiting outfit—metal, dies and "queer" money, almost perfect in appearance and weight.

Wants Address of Counterfeiters. Postmaster Van Cott of New York received a curious missive from a correspondent in Ash Grove, Mo. It contained 10 cents in postage stamps and a request for the address of counterfeit money dealers, should the postmaster know of any. An addressed envelope was also enclosed.

Arrested a Dead Man. Among the persons summoned at the Highgate (London) police court for breach of the muzzling order was a man who on being called did not appear. It was stated that he had since died. The bench, however, imposed the usual fine of 10 shillings and costs.
