

CHANGE IN FOOTBALL CIRCLES

The Proposed Formation Of An Eastern

Ontario League.

Active steps are being taken for the for-mation of a new football league, to be termed the eastern Ontario football league. This movement is practically the result of the dissolution of the Ontario league, and the treatment of some clubs this year by both the Ontario and Quebec unions, The dangers resulting from the ruling of cliquecontrolled unions have been fully exemplified during the past football season, and will lead to the breaking up of the Ontario union, and would have had a similar influence over the Quebec union, had it not been dissolved by the formation of the inter-collegiate union. The object of eastern players now is to form a league taking in the cities of Peterboro, Kingston, Brockville, Ottawa and Montreal, if the latter will join. If the formation is brought to a successful issue the league will include three senior teams, three intermediate and more juniors. As McGill and Ottawa college will be included in the inter-collegiate league, the

only senior teams left for the Quebec union will be the Ottawa city and Montreal city teams, and Kingston will form a team to play in the senior series. Peterboro, Kingston and Brockville, and probably Montreal, will place intermediate teams in the field. C. R. Webster, manager of the Granites, and other eastern football men,

have been talking over the scheme, and will communicate with the other teams through circulars. It is in order now for western Ontario to form a league of its Bad A Fine Trip.


