PROSPEROUS FARMER DEAD.

Robert Trotter, Pittsburg, Passed Away at His Home In the death of Robert Trotter, Cushendall, this morning, Pittsburg lost one of her best farmers and prosperous residents. For nearly sixty years Mr. Trotter had

made Pittsburg his home, and there by his thrift had built up a comfortable estate. During the last fourteen years he had been troubled with a severe form of dyspepsia, the irritation from which caused the formation of a tumor in the stomach. This tumor became so bad as to render him incapahle of work for six weeks, and this morning death relieved him of his sufferings. Robert Trotter was born in the southern part of Ireland and was seventy-eight years of age. About the year 1837, when he was eighteen years of age, he came to this

PRINCESS WAS POISONED.

The Late Czar's Morganatic Widow Meets Her Doom In Salvador.

GUATEMALA CITY, Nov. 30 .- A report which seems well authenticated, comes from Salvador that princess Dolgorouky. who claimed to be the morganatic widow of ezar Alexander II., was poisoned in Selvador by her secretary and an adventurer named count De Castro, Sormenho. She died suddenly and her death was given out as from yellow fever, but the body was disinterred by the authorities, whose suspicions had been aroused, and an autopsy revealed that she had been poisoned.

The alleged princess came to this coun try from Paris under contract to play the violin at the exposition, and left here about two months ago. She was heavily bejewelled, and it is thought her diamonda and the money she carried were the objects sought by the criminals.
