To Put the Finances of the Country on Sound Basis-Arbitration and Reciprocity Considered-Spain Should Have a Chance to Show What Can Be Done. WASHINGTON, Dec. 7. - Among other things president McKinley touched on in his address to congress were these :

The currency question was dealt with at considerable length. After reviewing the financial operations of the government since 1866, he made recommendation with the object of putting the finances on a sound basis. He says : "If no further legislation is had and the policy of selling bonds is to be continued, then congress should give the secretary of the treasury authority to sell bonds at long or short periods, bearing a less rate of interest than is now authorized by law.

"I earnestly recommend as soon as the receipts of the government are quite sufficient to pay all the expenses of the government, that when any of the United States notes are presented for redemption in gold and are redeemed in gold, such notes shall be kept and set apart and only paid out in exchange for gold. If we are to have any era of prosperity in the country, with sufficient receipts for the expenses of the government, we may feel no immediate embarrassment from our present currency; but the danger still exists and will be ever present, menacing us so long as the existing system continues.

"I recommend that the issue of the national bank notes be restricted to the denomination of ten dollars and upwards.

Treaties embodying these humane principles on broad lines without in any way imperilling our interests or our honor, shall have my constant encouragement."

John A. Kasson, of Iowa, as special commissioner plempotentiary to undertake the requisite negotiations with foreign countries desiring to avail themselves of these provisions. The negotiations are now proceeding with several governments, both European and American. It is believed that by a careful exercise of the powers conferred by that act some grievances of our own and of other countries in our mutual trade relations may be either removed or largely alleviated, and that the volume of our commercial exchanges may be enlarged, with advantage to both contracting parties."



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


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
