### NEWFANGLED BIBLE.

THE POLYCHROME DIFFERS RADICAL-LY FROM KING JAMES' VERSION.

The New Book of Psalms Written In Blank Verse-The Work of Professor Haupt and the Thirty-eight Eminent

Scholars Who Assisted Him. Since the authorized edition of King James the Bible has been issued by various sets of editors, each of whom have nade such changes as seemed necessary, out never before has such radical revision been attempted as in the edition soon to appear under the name of the polychrome Bible. In this not only sweeping changes have been made, but decided innovations have been introduced. The most startling of these is the use of many colored backgrounds for the printed text in order to show the different periods at which scholars have decided that the various sections were written. Another innovation is the use of illustrations copied from ancient architectural ruins. The idea of the polychrome Bible orig-

nated with Professor Paul Haupt of Johns Hopkins university, Baltimore, a gentleman who has gained an international reputation by his remarkable discoveries in Assyriology and other Semetic branches. For a scientist Professor Haupt is an intensely practical man. Rightly recognizing that such discov eries would be harmful if an attempt should be made to keep them secret from the mass of the people, the next thing to be done was to rewrite the Bible according to the new light which this mass of in formation shed. This has been done, and the result is the polychrome Bible. 1 sums up the result of the best Biblical scholarship in such a simple form that any

layman can read and understand it. The first step to be taken was to reduce the various books to the original Hebrew that they might be kept for all time for the use of scholars. Ten of these books have been issued, but the mass of Bible readers are more interested in the new English versions which are now in the press. One of these books, Isaiah, has been edited by Professor T. K. Cheyne, an English scholar of wide repute and canon of Rochester. He has devoted the last 30 years to a study of Isaiah and has pub lished five large volumes concerning it.

The book of Psalm's was placed in the hands of the famous German professor Julius Wellhausen, who, instead of giving the stiff prose of the common versions, has rendered all the verses metrically and presented the great poems in true poetic form. The familiar verses, Psalms ii, 1-3, appear in the polychrome version thus: Why do the heathen raige

And the people devise what is vain? The kings of the earth contrive plots And the princes take counsel together Against JHVH and against his anointed. "Their bonds we will break asunder And their cords we will cast away from us."

In the common versions these verses ap-1. Why do the heathen rage and the people imagine a vain thing?

2. The kings of the earth set themselves and the rulers take counsel together against the Lord and against his anointed, saying: 3. Let us break their bands asunder and cast away their cords from us. The color device is used in this way:

The prophecies of the real first Isaiah appear on white, uncolored paper; passages by the ancient editors of the book on light blue; poetic or propheție passages, written neither by Isaiah nor by the ancient editors, on light red, and so on. Besides the numerous illustrations taken from ancient monuments there are explanatory notes, brief, pointed, but comprehensive. So excellent an impression did he make on the English authorities there that he was put in charge of the movement to suppress the slave trade, with the rank of pasha. With re markable independence and fearlessnes he went right to work and arrested three of the pashas of the palace who were the real supporters of the slave trade. These men were the chief advisers and constant associates of the khedive. They were im mensely wealthy and proportionately in fluential in the corrupt court, one of them being at the time president of the Egyp

tian national council. But Colonel Schaeffer did not stop on this account. He pushed his charges with so much vigor and proved the guilt so clearly that the wicked pashas were only saved from prison by a coyal pardon given after they had prom ised never to buy any more slaves.

It was a great victory, but during the rest of his stay in Egpyt Colonel Schaoffer was in the hottest kind of hot water. Ev. ery slave owner and slave trader in the country, high or low, had a knife or a bullet ready for the daring foreigner. Plots without number were organized to assassinate him, and only the courage and devotion of his black orderlies saved his life. During the expedition of Lord Wolseley up the Nile to rescue Gordon Schaeifer saw more phases of the English service and was promoted to the rank of colonel He also received decorations from Germany and Austria for helping the German coioniai governor and explorer Major Wissman and for rescuing Austrian prisoners from the Maldi.


