

A platinum wire, so arranged as to carry a current of electricity, is inclosed in the blades of a pair of steel forceps or any other required instrument, the wire for this purpose being insulated by a bed of burnt pipe clay. This arrangement being perfected, a current of suitable voltage is turned on, the artery seized and compressed, sible. The temperature employed is about 180 degrees F., the fact being thus apparent that the principle involved this device is different from that of elec-


