

SAT UP IN HER COFFIN

Mrs. Drew Revived From Her Trance, But Died Soon After.

MIDDLEFORT, N.Y., Dec. 16 Robert Drew, said to be the wea'thies' woman in Niagara county, was buried yes. terday from her home here after she had been twice pronounced dead and once had been resuscitated. Mrs. Drew fell ill of typhoid fever several weeks ago. She ap. parently expired last Sunday morning. After she had been placed in a cettin the suddenly sat up and began to speak. She was removed to her bed, and all the physicians in the town hastened to attend her. Mrs. Drew sank into a cematose condition on Tuesday morning, and the physicians said she was dead. The family insisted that she was merely in a trance. Efforts were made for the rest of the week to revive her. Hot baths, electricity, bleeding and other means were resorted to. Decomposition finally set in, and yesterday the body was placed in a receiving vault.




