A MOST BRILLIANT AFFAIR.

CONVERSAZIONE AT QUEEN'S LAST NIGHT

A Decided Success—The Decorations Hurlled Those of Previous Years—Dance in Convocation Hall—Successful Dance and Promenade.

The conversation given by the students of Queen's in the college building last night was decidedly a brilliant success, and takes rank as the most notable event of the season. It was a fitting finale to the college work just before Christmas vacation. Three years have elapsed since a similar event has taken place at the college, and the students of good old Queen's have again placed themselves on record in giving to their friends such an excellent entertainment for which Queen's has long since been celebrated. The affair was well planned, and the committee in charge had worked with a vim for some weeks past in making preparations, and now they have seen their labors crowned with success. Those in charge deserve credit for the systematic and energetic way in which they performed their duties.

It was at first doubtful whether the authorities of the university would allow the affair to take place in the college building, because the floor of the third flat did not admit of dancing, but convocation hall was willingly offered for this purpose, and the conversation was an assured thing.

The decorations entirely eclipsed those of past years. Never have the long and dreary halls looked grander. A perfect transformation had taken place. Great taste had been displayed in decorating the building, and the place was a veritable fairyland. Large union jacks draped the floors on the main stairway; the staircase was hedged with a line of glittering bays, interspersed with bunting. The large alcove on the second floor, besides being beautifully furnished, was prettily decorated with streamers of flags and bunting, while a large figure containing sporting materials, interwoven with colors, hung between the pillars. The rest of the corridors was bright with flags and bunting. Bicycles, heavily draped with Queen's colors, extended the length of the large hall, the top of the lockers, adorned greatly to the effect. But convocation hall contained the most artistic decorations, and presented a grand sight to the beholder. Large flags were draped from the ceiling to the chandeliers; college colors and other drapery flashed off in many artistic folds along the walls and around the portraits of the departed mighty men of Queen's, whose solemn faces looked down in wonder at the gay and brilliant scene. The stage decorations were a beautiful piece of work. The front was draped with flags, and contained a railing festooned with smilax and holly, the prettiest decoration in the whole building. Flowers extended on each side of the railing of the stage, which was also beautifully furnished. Above the stage on the middle of the wall was the work of the senior year in arts. Surrounded by drapery of college colors were the words "Alma Mater, '98, Victoria." The gallery was also profusely decorated. The entire room was fitted up for "sitting out," and was certainly a very cozy spot. On the upper flat refreshments were served by the caterer, T. Parkin.

The college building was ablaze from top to bottom as an early hour, and at eight o'clock the guests began to arrive. The heavy fall of snow by no means dampened the ardor of any. All the roosebuds and other maidens of beauty were there to enjoy an evening with the students. The guests were received by the reception committee, conducted to dressing rooms, and thence to convocation hall which was very soon fully taxed. At nine o'clock the concert commenced. James S. Shortt, M.A., president of the alma mater society gave a short introductory address, welcoming the guests and extending to them the hospitality of the students. On the platform, besides a number of ladies, were Sir Sandford Fleming, Chancellor of the University, and principal Grant.

The concert programme was divided into two parts, and a short intermission was given during which the band of the 14th P.W.O. rifles discourses music. The concert numbers consisted of Part I—Selection, "Little Tommy Went a Fishing," glee club; solo, "He was a Prince," Mrs. Mima Lund-Reburn; banjo solo, "Darkies Patrol," C. A. Porteous; solo, "The Mule-killer," A. C. Cunningham; solo, "Williams; solo, (a) Cavatina, "Little Signori," (Mayerbeer); (b) song, "Loch Inghair," Mrs. Mima Lund-Reburn. Part II—Selection, "The Morn," glee club; solo, "Father O'Flynn," J. M. Williams; piano solo, "Rhapsodie Hongroise, No. 2," (Liszt), Miss Norma Tandy; solo, "Good Night," Mrs. Mima Lund-Reburn; solo, "The Sailor's Grave," J. M. Williams.

Each number on the programme was well rendered, and received well-deserved applause. The numbers by Mrs. Mima Lund-Reburn of Toronto, and J. M. Williams of Montreal, were gems, and these singers received repeated encores, to which they kindly responded.

Delegates present from other universities and colleges were: McGill, R. E. McConnell; Victoria, B. A. Cobbe; McMaster, W. B. H. Taskie; Varsity, N. E. Hinch; Trinity, F. H. Lingwood; Osgoode, J. M. Farrell.

At the conclusion of the concert there was an intermission of half an hour for the distribution of dancing and promenade cards. One detachment of the band occupied the platform of convocation hall, and another was stationed in the library. Both played selections simultaneously, so that numbers could be engaged for either dance or promenade. The music rendered by the band during the evening was the best ever given at a similar affair, and many were the compliments paid to the musicians under the able leadership of bandmaster T. C. Carey. Canvases had been laid on the floor of convocation hall, and here for two hours and a half a merry crowd tripped the "light fantastic." What "mattered" it if one was jostled or bumped, or even stamped upon; that was of no consequence, and although the hall was crowded, yet every number on the programme was given through, and each one given an encore. Then the promenade went on throughout the other parts of the building, and all enjoyed themselves thoroughly. It is necessary to refrain from any word-painting of the beautiful ladies, the joyous students, the whirling dance, the inspiring music, or the delicacies of the refreshment room.

At half-past one o'clock the night's enjoyment came to an end, and everyone went home convinced that the conversation of 1897 was the best ever held at Queen's, and feeling sorry for the great world at large who had never attended such an affair.

If a few minutes' start can be obtained, they take the risk of outrunning and eluding their pursuers. One of the men who broke away yesterday had only ninety-two days to serve.

A Dive Into The Cellar. A fatality that would have marred the pleasure of the occasion came near occurring Thursday night at the Hotel Frontenac during the medical dinner. An undergraduate accidentally fell into the cellar, bumping on the top of the seventeen steps in the rear of the main dining room. Friends thought for sure his brains would be dashed out on the stone floor, but fortunately near the foot of the stairs was a huge pile of ashes, and into this head first, pitched the youthful disciple of Esculapius. When rescued he presented a ludicrous appearance.

An Official's Opinion. A penitentiary official suggests that a standing reward be offered for the capture or information that would lead to the capture of convicts that break away from the prison. This would greatly lessen their chances of successfully escaping, as people instead of aiding the felons, as at present, would be more likely to obstruct their progress for the sake of obtaining the reward.

Claims It Was Misapplied. During the summer of 1896 it well be remembered one of the city's steam fire engines and a couple of firemen were sent up to Deseronto to assist in extinguishing a conflagration there. For this service the Rathbun Co., forwarded here to the presiding mayor a cheque for \$100. The money was put into the city treasury to be used for general purposes, and the committee on fire, water and light never benefited to the extent of a single dollar by the gift. The engine suffered damage at the Deseronto fire and was repaired at a cost of \$25. No appropriation was made when the budget was struck to cover this outlay, and alderman Minnes, chairman of the committee on fire, water and light, contends that the money should have been placed to the credit of that committee, in order to cover the cost of repairs to the engine, sustained on the occasion of the trip to Deseronto.

LAST MEETING THIS YEAR.

COMMITTEE ON FIRE, WATER AND LIGHT ADJOURNS.

High Tribute Paid to Alderman Minnes, Chairman of the Committee—For the Manner in Which He Conducted the Business of the Committee—Electric Lights Wanted. The last regular meeting for 1897 of the committee on fire, water and light was held in the engineer's office yesterday afternoon. Present: Chairman Minnes, aldermen Wright, Livingston, Allen and Bell.

On the communication of Joseph Carlington, asking for the erection of an arc light at the entrance to his tannery, the committee recommended that the urgent consideration of next year's committee, there not being any funds on hand to carry out the work this year. Each light costs the city \$72.60 yearly.

Alderman Moores requested the erection of a light at the foot of Gore street. It was greatly needed, as it would not only light up Gore street, but would also be of much service to the locomotive works. The committee recommended that action, as alderman Moores had made a communication on the matter to the council.

Alderman Allen introduced this resolution: "That the committee on fire, water and light for the year 1897 at its last meeting assembled, takes this opportunity of placing on record its high sense of appreciation for the manner in which its chairman, alderman Minnes, has conducted the business pertaining to his office during the past year. He was ever courteous and his efforts have always been directed to the best interests of the city. The city fire department has increased in efficiency, and the conduct of its members has not been excelled during any previous year, largely due to the tact and management of the chairman of the committee on fire, water and light."

In support of the resolution the mover hoped alderman Minnes would be returned to the council. The city could not afford to lose the benefit derived from his tact, his management and wide experience. Alderman Livingston endorsed the sentiments expressed in the resolution and concurred in all the previous speaker had said. Alderman Wright, an old member of the council, and one who had had considerable experience in committee work, added testimony to the ability possessed by alderman Minnes for the position he occupied so creditably during the year just closing. The speaker had been a member of a great number of committees, but never experienced so much pleasure at meetings as at enjoyed this year under the chairmanship of alderman Minnes. He was genial and affable at all times.

In reply chairman Minnes expressed his surprise at the resolution, couched as it was in such kind words. In connection with the committee he had merely endeavored to perform his duty, and he felt grateful, indeed, that his efforts had been appreciated by the members. He was not expecting an expression of such gracious sentiment, and he fully appreciated the kind words. He could not have desired a better committee. The members were faithful to their duties and their meetings have always been conducted in harmony. The committee's efforts tending to increase the efficiency of the fire department were successful. With the funds available, the very best work was made of the money. Over 1,000 feet of new hose was added, besides jackets, nozzles, door openers and other necessary appliances not in use here. The men, likewise, were fitted out with new uniforms and caps. He was satisfied the committee had worked conscientiously to add to the fire department's efficiency.

'T WAS NOT ORTHODOX Delegates Were Not Appointed in the Regular Way. The alma mater society of Queen's held a special meeting Friday afternoon to enquire into the method by which the college representatives were appointed to the annual meeting of the O. R. F. U. W. C. Baker, president of the football club, said that it was the usual custom in Queen's to call a meeting to appoint delegates to the rugby union, and that no such meeting had been called, nor had he, as president of the club, been informed of the intention to send delegates. He wanted to know if anyone knew anything about it.

W. R. Carmichael, secretary of the athletic committee, said that he did not know who appointed the delegates but that the manager had told him that two graduates residing in Toronto, had been asked to represent the university.

It was finally brought out that the college representatives were not selected in the orthodox manner and were not the reflection of the student body, and the following motion was carried unanimously, it being decided to send a copy of it to the secretary of the union: "That in the opinion of this meeting it is desirable that the public should know the persons who represented Queen's at the annual meeting of the O. R. F. U., last Saturday, were not duly appointed by the students of Queen's and were not acting under instructions from them."

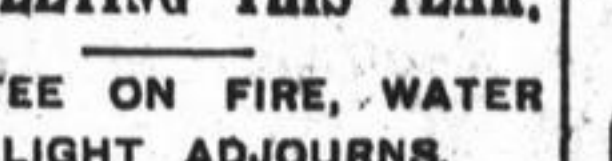
