HE IS THE ALEXANDER OF THE WHEEL.

Record Breaker of Prominence-Some of His Achievements-He Wears One Hundred and Sixteen Century Bars-His Work Discouraged All Competitors. It is recorded that when Alexander the

Conqueror learned he had no further

worlds to overcome, he seated himself beside a big stone and wept. F. O Myers, the Canadian road king, may be likened to the great conqueror, minus the weeping. After breaking all the wheeling records in sight, he calmly retires, like Longfellow's Blacksmith, with the knowledge, "something ventured; something done," but, like little Oliver Twist, he has a yearning, and, sighing, he whispers "more." While he cannot claim to have left footprints in the sands of time, still he can assert with truth that he has wheeled all records up to date,

completing miles at faster rate than others. There is very little of the road between here and Belleville that he does not know as well as a school boy knows his alphabet. He has been over the ground something like 220 times.

Myers is a native of Buffalo, N.Y., but he does not show it. He lacks the bragga docio of the yankee born. He is only twenty-six years of age and began riding in the autumn of 1895. During the sum

The rider does not mark the papers, so that there is no possibility of any crookedness being practiced. If it was the case that riders were permitted to sign their own papers, every other rider in the dominion would obe flying through space at the rate of a mile a minute

WILL GIVE IT PUBLICITY. ABBOTT BY-LAW TO BE EXTEN-SIVELY PUBLISHED.

The Decision of the Printing Committee-The Expense of Publishing Elevator By-Laws Caused a Deficit—The Conclusions

of the Committeemen.

The civic committee on printing met in the city clerk's office yesterday afternoon to consider the question of advertising the Abbott Bros.' bonus by law in more papers than one, as provided by law. Alderman Tait understood that the by-law was to be inserted the regular number of times in all the local papers. Alderman Stewart pointed out that by doing such it would cost \$740, or \$185 for each local paper. It was customary for the by-laws to be printed alternately by the two old daily papers. The Abbott by-law fell to the lot of the News.

Alderman McKelvey-"Then what is the use of discussing the matter. The News has it. It was understood to be printed in only one paper. The Mooers elevator by law was printed in only one

Alderman Taylor-"When the printing of the Mooers' bonus by law was under discussion, there was some talk of the Freeman getting some of the printing "

Alderman McKelvey-"And we decided not to give the Freeman the printing of the by law because the paper is not read by the people generally." He was not sure that the committee could take the contract away from the News. Alderman Stewart cautioned the mem

bers upon the necessity for curtailment of expenditure. The committee's appropria tion was only \$1,400, whereas so far \$2,400 had been expended. Alderman McKelvey pointed out that the committee could not be held responsible for the deficit. It was advertising the two elevator bonus by laws-unlooked for expenditure-that used up the money.

in his act of giving the printing of the by law to the News. James Daly, of the Freeman, presented his claim for a share of the advertising. The paper was entitled to share under a resolution adopted by the council. Alderman McKelvey said that in Toronto by-laws were printed in only one paper, but alderman Carson pointed out that no one paper reached all the electors, and it was very essential that all the electors should read this particular by law, the most important ever placed before the people. He moved, seconded by alderman Tait, that the by law be given one insertion each in the WHIG, Times and Free man at a cost of \$75 each, and that the News insert the by-law the usual number of times. It was moved in amendment by alderman McKelvey that the first three mentioned papers be allowed \$60 each for one insertion. It was pointed out that the cost of one insertion to each newspaper would be \$87 50. Alderman Taylor said there was not any use in offering the newspapers \$60 for \$87.50 worth of work. This was the ground taken by alderman Carson. Alderman McKelvey admitted the necessity of having a copy of the by law placed in the hands of every elector. He suggested hand bills as a cheap method. His amendment was put and lost, and alderman Carson's resolution

To advertise the Mooers elevator bonus by-law cost the city \$455 95. The Abbott bonus by law will be done for \$410. It is the longest by-law on local record.
