His dress is usually loud and horsy, and he is eminent only among cockneys.

It was discovered that he kept a valet and a secretary; that his clothes were made by the most fashionable tailors, and that he had a remarkable fondness for smoking big, black eigars.

Sloane began to be deluged with offers from all the prominent horse owners in Great Britain. Even the Prince of Wales gave him a mount. Next, society broke all traditions, and efforts were made to make him the lion in several swell social triumphs Sloane might have attained had be been at all ambitious for that kind of honors. But he was not. His common sense would not allow his head to be turned by any such empty flattery. He was willing to meet men who could be of use to him in his profession, but he did not care to shine in drawing rooms.

Although he lived expensively in London, he kept well within his income, for during the racing season he was making about \$200 a day, which, with all his extravagance, was much more than his expenses. Even that, he says, is not so well as he can do in America, where his income

The fame of this placer directly led to the discovery of the rich diggings on Bonanza and El Dorado creeks, where the best claims in the Yukon district are located.




