NOT A LIVE ISSUE.

The pope has issued his long-promised encyclical on the Manitoba school question. He is not satisfied with the settlement suggested by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and accepted by the Greenway government. He is not satisfied with the arrangement by which the children of the national schools are allowed half an hour of each day for religious training. The religious education of the Catholic children, according to the ruling of the church, should be blended with their secular education, and this cannot be done under the present school system.

QUEBEC'S EDUCATION BILL.

The bill which proposed to create an education department in connection with the Quebec government is in a precarious position. It has reached its second reading in the assembly, and may not be carried any farther. Why? Because one of the legislative council, a liberal, has notified the leader of the government that he cannot support some of its features. That indicates that, with a party opposition in the upper chamber, now about evenly divided, the bill will not get through.

DROWNED AT SEELEY'S BAY.

A Little Girl Loses Her Own Life In An Attempt To Save Her Little Brothers.

An extremely sad accident occurred at Seeley's Bay on Wednesday and has cast a gloom over the community and turned the season of joy and gladness for Edward Smith and his family into one of deepest grief. Mr. Smith lives just across the canal from Seeley's Bay and three of his children attend school in the village—two boys and a girl. On Wednesday the three were returning from school and undertook to cross the canal on the ice. From the meagre particulars at hand it appears the two boys, aged six and eight years, were on ahead and broke through a thin place in the ice. Little Gertrude rushed to the rescue, and though she succeeded in saving her brothers fell into the icy water herself and before assistance could reach her she was herself drowned. The parents are grief-stricken.

CIVIC ADMINISTRATION.

A fear is expressed that too many new hands may secure places in the council and so encumber it with an unworkable element. True, it takes time, some years, to become really familiar with civic routine, with the work of the various departments, but the aldermen are not administrators, and should not be expected to become such. They are elected to legislate in the interest of the people, not to see that the law is carried out, not in any way to interfere with the operation of application of that law.

The Telegram has been giving the subject its consideration, and remarks that "Toronto is nearer to good government than ever before, because never before were the great departments of the municipal government in charge of such strong men. The treasury department is strongly and ably guarded by R. T. Coady. Charles Sheard, at the head of the health department, is an unusual type of public official, and neither inefficiency nor weakness will make the assessment department a danger to the people while R. J. Fleming is on guard. Toronto never got better service from any lawyer than the city is getting from James S. Fullerton, the corporation counsel, and while E. H. Keating is not as strong or as economical as he might be, it is simple justice to admit that he has proved himself to be a long way stronger and abler than any of his predecessors."

All of which is designed to show that the departments being ably directed by competent heads the duties of the aldermen become lighter, and such as any common sense man can easily perform. The business man, accustomed to think quickly and clearly on the transactions of the day, can readily adapt himself to the requirements of the city, and he becomes an expert in its service as he accumulates experience and has occasion to study municipal reforms. The German idea of municipal government is reckoned to be the best extant. According to it men of acknowledged ability, and of special fitness for office, are educated for it, and advanced and remunerated as their services warrant. The council has nothing to do with the administration of its laws. A certain course is considered and decided upon. There the council's responsibility begins and ends. With the officials there is no interference. They discharge their duty fearlessly, courageously, efficiently. No duty is neglected or over-looked. The departments are perfect in their organization, and give perfect satisfaction.

And this is just as it should be. The council should call for reports from its officers as to the requirements of the city, in any direction, and discuss them. But no council, nor any member of it, should be asked to do the work of the official in any particular. The official should not be reminded of his duty at any time. The faithful, punctual, intelligent, dignified departmental head will not need, and will not suffer, poking up. That it is done or attempted is a reflection upon the staff of any municipality. Let us have the German or American system and see how it will work. The officials of the post office department have done a graceful act in the handsome presentation to Lieut.-Col. White, late deputy postmaster-general. It was a pleasure to do business with that officer. He had a due appreciation of the true motto that public office is a public trust, and persons communicating with him were always treated with gentlemanly consideration. He held office for a great many years with popular acceptance both within and without the department, but the best of our citizens, however old age and he retired because of advancing years.

The finances of the town were gone into minutely by M. S. Madole and Dr. Ward and criticised by E. S. Lapum and G. F. Rutan, they claiming that the finances of the town were not run according to their ideas of economy, and some very trivial transactions were mentioned to draw discredit on the efforts of the councilors in office. Some very fine and educative speeches were made by some of the aspirants for office, which no doubt will have their telling influence on the day of election.

Yesterday morning as George De Groff, tin-smith, in the employ of Boyle & Son, was measuring the roof of the Gibbard furniture company's factory, and walking along backwards with the tape measure in his hand, he tripped and fell over the roof to the ground, a distance of twenty-five or thirty feet, and very narrowly escaped instant death. He alighted on his feet on a platform used for loading purposes and broke through an inch board, which was probably the means of saving his life. Those who were eye witnesses of the accident thought the man was killed but after a few minutes he was able to speak and in a short time recovered sufficiently to be driven to his home. No bones were broken but he complains of feeling very sore. It was a very narrow escape. Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Scott left last week on a trip to the Pacific coast.

At the police court this morning a young dry goods clerk was given one more chance by the magistrate. There is an old commitment standing against him, and should he again misconduct himself he will be taken direct to jail to serve two months in lieu of paying a fine of \$20 and costs.

With reference to the paragraph which appeared in this journal on Nov. 24th, headed "A Servant Man's Misadventure," we regret that the same has been associated in the minds of some readers with T. A. Brown, late butler in the employ of bishop Lewis. The River Frozen Over. Last night the river froze over between the city and the adjacent islands. The "take" was not very heavy and may not remain, but if the weather does not turn soft or a wind arise, the chances are that the ice will hold good until the spring. This is the earliest period for a great number of years at which the river has frozen over. Last year there was open water until the 14th of January, and the year previous the ice "took" on January 6th. The steamer Pierpont experienced difficulty in getting out this morning, but managed to get away to the Cape on time.
