THE DAIRY MARKETS.

What the Week has Produced in this Line That is Worth Reporting.

Kingston Cheese Board, The weekly meetings of the county of Frontenac cheese board are not now so well attended as at first. The slim attendance at the last two meetings show a lack of interest in the proceedings of the board. The cause of the falling off in the number of dairyman at the market is said to be the low prices offered by the buyers. If the cheesemen came to the board they would not sell their cheese anyway, they say, until the market rose. The buyers on the other hand are threatening to absent themselves from the meetings if they do not prove more satisfactory They offer market prices but the dairymen will not sell. Several of the factorymen are in favor of selling their cheese at the market rate, but others object. It is claimed that if the cheesemen sell their cheese with the market, as the Watertown cheese board does, the interest in the board's proceedings would grow instead of decrease. The bulletin on Saturday showed that cheese was still a drug on the market, and that the prices were about the same as on the Saturday before. The Liverpool cable was 38s 6d, which was not a very encouraging price to the factorymen. Little Falls was quoted at 61 to 62c, and Peterboro at 6 13-16 to 7c. Messrs, Madden, Napanee. Smart, of Brockville, and a Kingston gentleman were the buyers present. They urged the cheesemen to move their cheese. They should either consign it to Liverpool at 6c or sell it for 7c here. If the cheese were moved immediately it would meet the September market prices. The sellers were anxious to know why it was that the buyers thought it better to consign when they themselves remained quiet. "Well," said a buyer, what can we do with you?
