Kingston Cheese Board.

Kingston, Aug. 24.—Cheese salesmen were not feeling lively on Saturday afternoon. The market was dull and no sales were reported. The salesmen registered the following, all of July make:

panee; McCarger, Belleville; and a Kingstonian, buyers, were present. No sales were made, in fact the buyers were not ordered to make any purchases. During the week, however, Mr. Madden secured the cheese of the following factories at 7c: Harrowsmith, 400 boxes Perth Road, 100 boxes; Odessa, 100 boxes. There was about 4 000 boxes registered, mostly July make. Many of the factories are consigning. They secure 6c at sight, the balance after the sales are made. The South Lake cheese factory consigned 200 cheese and the salesman said that he had secured two shillings more than any other factory in Canada. Mr. Whitton, who represents Hodgson Bros., Montreal, has Jas. McFarland, J. B. Wilson, Jos. Haig, secured the following consignments: Glenvale factory, 300 boxes; Elginburg, 200

Hodgson, 150 Rutledge, 300. James Whitton, cheese instructor, who has concluded his labors in this direction, said to a reporter: "I have visited most of the factories in this county and I find a wonderful improvement in the manufacture of cheese in the last three years. Having made the rounds during the past ten days i find a great many cheese of July make requiring to be moved out, as in nearly all cases they are getting off in color. This is particularly the case with the cheese made during the first two weeks in July." The cheese made is generally good fair average.
