EARL SHAFTESBURY.

tie Passes Away at a Ripe Age-His Devo

London, Oct. 1.—The Earl of Shaftes. bury died to-day. London, Oct. 2 .- Lord Shaftesbury's last moments were peaceful. Immediately before his death he dictated two letters for his daughters and conversed cheerfully with several members of his family, bidding them all farewell. Shortly before the dying struggle he was conscious and preserved his mental faculties until the last.

Shaftesbury (Earl of), K.G., The Right

Hon. Anthony Ashley-Cooper, born in

London, April 28, 1801, was educated at Christ Church, Oxford, where he obtained a first class in classics, in 1822, graduated M.A. in 1832, and was created D.C.L. in 1841. He was returned, as Lord Ashley, member for Woodstock, in 1826, and supported the governments of Liverpool and Canning, and in the administration of the Duke of Wellington was a Commissioner of the Board of Control. He was returned for Dorchester in 1830, and for Dorsetshire in 1831, which county he represented till February 1846. He was elected one of the members for Bath in August 1847, and sat for that borough till he succeeded his father in the peerage in 1851. He was a Lord of the Admiralty in the late Sir R. Peel's administration in 1834 5; and, on the removal from the House of Commons of the late Mr. Sadler, took charge of the Ten Hours Bill. When Sir R.
