"In vain I argued with the policeman that, being a light weight, the structure ran no danger from my crossing it."

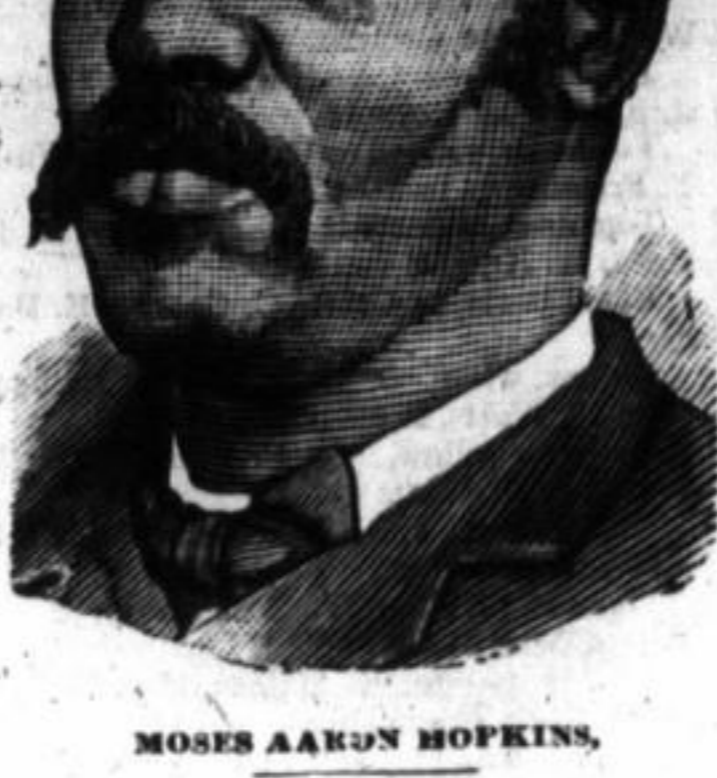

EARL SHAFTESBURY.

London, Oct. 1.—The Earl of Shaftesbury died to-day. London, Oct. 2.—Lord Shaftesbury's last moments were peaceful. Immediately before his death he dictated two letters for his daughters, and conversed cheerfully with several members of his family, bidding them all farewell. Shortly before the dying struggle he was unconscious and preserved his mental faculties until the last."



MOSES AARON HOPKINS, OF NORTH CAROLINA, NEW MINISTER TO LIBERIA—A FINE FELLOW.

In the words of a learned author, "The establishment of the Republic of Liberia was virtually an attempt, made by American philanthropists, to show the capacity of the negro for self-government."

Liberia has six hundred miles of coast line. Its area is about fourteen thousand square miles, and its population of whom fewer than twenty thousand are from the United States. The United States sends a colored man to Liberia as Minister Resident and Consul-General. President Cleveland's choice has fallen upon the Rev. Moses Aaron Hopkins, A. M. Mr. Hopkins' official residence is in Monrovia, Liberia, a city of about 3,000 inhabitants. His salary is the comfortable income of \$5,000 a year."

He was born in slavery, in 1846, in Virginia. He escaped from the house of bondage and found service, first as a cook in the army of life and property in the Ohio and Mississippi rivers. He was nearly twenty years of age when he went to Pittsburg, Pennsylvania, where he secured employment, and almost immediately after set about learning the alphabet as the first step towards education."

Mr. Hopkins worked hard in his scant leisure to prepare for a higher education, was admitted a student at Avery College Allegheny City, Pennsylvania. In 1870 he entered Lincoln University, as Freshman, and was graduated in 1874. He next read theology in the Seminary at Auburn, New York, where he was graduated with honors in 1877, the first colored man completing the course in that institution. Contemporaneously with his professional course he preached on Sundays in a chapel at Utica, New York. After receiving ordination as an evangelist from the hands of the Presbytery of Baltimore, he removed to Franklin, North Carolina, where he has been a successful pastor. During his incumbency of 8 years he has built more than ten thousand dollars' worth of church and school property in the county, and has been the instrument of adding more than two hundred members to the local churches. His resignation of the pastorate, after his present appointment had been given him, was not accepted by the local board, which gave him leave of absence instead. He will sail for Liberia with his family about the middle of October, 1885."

Mr. Hopkins is not a Democrat, but has been independent in his political action. His philanthropy, especially as manifested towards people of his own race, has given him great local prominence."

CRIME IN OLD IRELAND.

Is it on the Increase?—Statement of an Eminent Judge.

Cork, Oct. 1.—Judge Ferguson, in a speech here yesterday, said that never before in the history of Ireland had such a reckless disregard of life and property been known. In immediate steps were not taken for the suppression of crime a more stringent Coercion Act would be necessary."

Referring to the alarming increase of boycotting in Ireland, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, in a speech yesterday, said that the government was preparing to deal with the evil with a strong hand. He believed that the Irish people would applaud the action of the government in regard to the matter. He denounced the Gladstone manifesto as misleading in its statements concerning the occurrences of the past and its promises for the future. He said the reports of crime in Ireland were absurdly overdrawn. Crime in Ireland now was nothing compared to what it was in 1880 and 1881. Boycotting, however, was rife in certain districts, and the government would spare no efforts to put down the practice and prosecute the offenders whenever evidence could be obtained against them. The government would also introduce some kind of counter demonstration against those forms of boycotting with which no law in the world was able to cope. If these means failed the government would find other means. The law must be upheld."
