The presence of Sir John Macdonald at the Carleton exhibition was not so very remarkable, because it was in his own constituency, but the Caron gush at Gananoque was simply inexcusable. And let it be borne in mind that the fairs of this province are under the special care of the Ontario Government, and get the grants which serve to keep them alive from the gritty Legislature. To attempt to turn them into political machines, and to use them in the advancement of Toryism, or rather Tody ism, is evidence enough that whatever some people lack it is not cheek.
