THE DAIRY MARKET.

What the Week has Produced in this

Commodity Worth Noting.

Montreal, Nov. 27.—At Canton and Ogdensburg recently sales have been made at 8 to 9 c. Our market has shown no change of moment, the general tone being dull. There is, however, a disposition to do business and a few lots have changed hands. The fact is that very little cheese is offering and it looks as if it would take some trouble to have approved lines. Any "finest Septem. to buy any good lines. Any "finest September and October at 81 to 81c" would proba-bly be taken up quick, but none are to be

Woodstock, Ont., Nov. 27.-Eleven factories offered 10,200 boxes cheese. Several salesmen present did not register, and a number said they would rather hold their stock than sell at present prices. Next market day, December 9th, first day of the Provincial fat stock show at Woodstock. Montreal, Nov. 30.—The position is stea-

dy. Prices now current will not be accepted by holders for the present, and there is little pressure to sell. The supply west of Toronto foots up a total of 141,000 boxes. It shows that a pile of cheese has been made during the season, but it cannot be relied on. Liverpool cable unchanged at 45s. Other cable quoted at 32s to 36s for July, 39s to 42s for August, and 43s to 48s for September. Exports from New York this week are 10,000 boxes. Fine to finest Sept. and Oct., 8c to 81c; fine to finest August, 71 to 8c; and lower grades, 4c to 7c.

Uilea and Little Falls Markets.

Utica. Nov. 30.-As to-day was the closing meeting of the board, but little business was done. Factorymen, as a rule, have but a small amount of cheese on their hands, and some have sold out entirely. The sales were small, and the ruling price was established at 8c, or to below last week. Transactions aggregated 2,767 boxes. Sales were as follows: 6 lots, 322 boxes, at 74c; 16 lots, 1 417 boxes, at 8c. (ruling price); 2 lots, 147 boxes, at 81c : 2 lots, 182 boxes, at 81c ; lots, 196 boxes, at 81c; 7 lots, 510 boxes, on commission.

Little Falls, Nov. 30 .- The cheese market was dull and without special feature. The season has been an unprofitable one, and there is nothing at the close of it that promises much for the year to come. Transactions were: I lot at 7 c, 2 lots at 7 c, 9 lots at 8c, 2 lots at 8fc, 3 lots at 8fc. Total, 1,700 boxes. 250 boxes farm dairy cheese sold at 71 to 81c; bulk at 8c.
