"Out of this trifling incident, the London Times concocted a story at variance with truth in every particular, and made it the occasion of an outpouring of vulgar abuse of America, and Americans generally. As is usual when the Times gives the key note, the minor presses took up the cry, and for at least two days, Mr Dallas labored under the imputation of having put a studied affront upon the Queen. Of course an immense deal of patriotic wrath was unne-
