A person who is well acquainted with the exact state of affairs tells me that if the two Divans unatimously demand the union of Moldavia and Wallachia, and England and France give them their support, the Porte will be obliged to yield; he, however, added that if the Western Governments displayed any irresolution, Austria and the Porte would be sure to have matters entirely their own way. It the principalities are united, the Hospodariate will be made hereditary in the family of the Prince elected by the people; but if they remain separate, the Hospodars will be chosen for life, instead of for the terms of seven years.
