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HON. MR. LAURIER DEFENDS

THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL ATTACKED BY SIR CHARLES. Conservative Pledges as to the Senate—The Governor-General Performed a Notable Service—An Admirable Reply by Mr. Laurier.

OTTAWA, Sept. 21.—The action of the governor-general in refusing to sanction the appointment of senators and civil servants upon the recommendation of the defeated government was the subject of a change of opinion across the floor of the house between Sir Charles Tupper and the prime minister.

Sir Charles complained of the course of his excellency in withdrawing his confidence from his chosen advisers but he was officially aware of the results of the election, and he was so far in the imputation of partisan motives that the speaker was obliged to remind him of the rule of the house which forbids a member to speak in disparagement of the governor-general.

Mr. Laurier replied to the leader of the opposition, and he made a most effective defence of the attitude of Lord Aberdeen upon the question with which he was dealing.

Dr. Borden (minister of militia) replied that an officer of the department has been asked to make a report.

Mr. Foster that the buildings and apparatus of the central experimental farm at Ottawa have cost \$178,012.

It came out in a reply by Mr. Davies to Mr. Leonard that Hon. J. Angers, late minister, had authorized commander Wakeham to place the government cruiser La Canadienne at the disposal of the conservative candidate in Gaspere during the late general election.

There are to be no votes of railway subsidies this session was the interesting statement made by Mr. Blair, minister of railways.

The senate bill to incorporate the Wesleyan Methodist connexion of Canada was read a second time, after some discussion as to the propriety of incorporating the sect under the name.

Five Young Men Have An Exciting Time. But. Escape 22.—Chester Stacey, an employee of the Gannacque electric light company, had a narrow escape from serious injury yesterday, while at work wiring into A. Lalonde's residence, King street west.

It seems that he was on the branch of a tree when the limb broke holding him, and he fell a distance of about ten feet. He was lacerated and taken to his home, where he is being attended by Dr. Bird. No bones were broken and outside of a severe shaking up he has no serious injuries.

Five young men who were out sailing Sunday had an exciting trip, which they are likely to remember the remainder of their lives. They sailed to Clayton, St. Lawrence, and returned to the city on Monday morning, and remained at dinner, and started home about three o'clock.

Shortly after leaving the dock they discovered that they had more canvas than they could carry in the gale that had sprung up. They returned and put in double reefs and again pointed for home by the head of Grindstone island, but when a little over a mile above Grindstone island their yacht was swamped and they were obliged to get the yacht righted and bailed out, and drifted with the wind down to Calumet island, the home of Charles F. Emery, where they were entertained for a few days, and then returned to the city.

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UNITED STATES CAMPAIGN.

A BOMBHELL THROWN INTO THE GOLD CAMP.

The Letter of Prince Bismarck Favoring Bismarckism, Regarded as the First National Declaration of the Campaign—Several Million Pamphlets to be Distributed.

CHICAGO, Sept. 22.—The democratic national committee regards the letter of Prince Bismarck, favoring bismarckism, as a step towards an international agreement and the cablegram sent to Bryan by the international agricultural congress at Buda Pesth as making the first genuine political sensation of the campaign in favor of free silver coinage.

These documents silence the platform assertions of the republicans on the point that the United States alone could not change the monetary system of the world and that agitation would be fatal to the international bismarckism. The committee decided to have these declarations translated into several languages, especially German, and to distribute several millions of the pamphlets.

New York, Sept. 22.—The American merchant marine association will have to elect a new president. Arthur Sewall has tendered his resignation. He has consented that the association may be used for political purposes, and his acceptance of the position was based upon the stipulation that no partnership should be introduced.
