





> Seeing Into the Eye. One of the neatest uses to which the Roentgen photography has been applied is the detection of glass splinters and other foreign bodies in the eye. The difficulty of photographing the eye is very great, because it is practically inclosed in a bony case and can not be got at, Dr. H. Lewkowitsch has, however, invented a contrivance which enables this operation to be successfully performed. The plate is so made that it can be inserted (under anaesthetics, of course) into the orbital cavity between the os lachrymae and the eye-ball, and in this way a photograph can be taken which shows the position of objects quite beyond the reach of the ophthalmoscope. In fact Helmholtz's wonderful instrument useless, except where the foreign body is located in transparent tissue, and is free from extravasation of bleed, conditions which do not apply to the Roentgen


