

HE COMMITTED MURDERS.

The Police Drag-net in Denver Secured Very

DENVER, Col., Oct. 20 .- The "lone highwayman," who has held up twentythree parties in and around Denver, protecting himself from capture by the free use of his revolver, proves to be, by his own confession, a California murderer. He also committed the murder of Joel Ash worth, in Denver, which raised great excitement at the time of the crime and which was ascribed to jealousy of a woman. His name is Albert H. Downen. He was hauled in a police drag-net last night and broke down. He stated that in 1885 he murdered a man in St. James' park, San Jose, Cal., who resisted his attempt to rob him, and in a few days later killed a woman whom he tried to rob. He was at the time an inmate of St. Quinten penitentiary in California. He was engaged in robbing Southern Pacific trains previous to this. He went to Montana after his release from San Quinten and then drifted to Cheyenne and Denver. He says he will plead guilty to murder when arraigned in court.
