



The Prime Essentials For a Good Educa-No defence need ever have been made for the study of the "classics," if graduates had always understood that these are helps and means to a liberal education, instead of making them the main thing. As a mental discipline and as immensely enriching one's knowledge of his own language, and his power of language, the study and drill in the Latin and Greek is an invaluable privilege to every true scholar and every worker in the 'learned professions."

The trouble is that too many college students have allowed these studies to take the place of common school education, and have thus brought their classic acquirements into contempt, as they simply pre-sent a spectacle of "learned ignorance" when tested in actual business. Accordingly we can understand Horace Greeley's disdain of "liberally educated" young men. He had tried some of them, and found them wanting. An anecdote told by Hon. Oliver H. Smith of Indiana, illustrates the

foolish mistake we have spoken of. "The student" (of law) "should have a good sound English education. He should spell well, read well and write well, and understand the principles of arithmetic Rev. 
