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A NEW FORCE.

PROPOSED TO USE MAGNETIC POWER FOR AIRSHIPS.

by Which He Believes Aerial Navigation Will be Made Possible and the North Pole Easily Reached.

An entirely new scheme looking suggested by Mr. A. W. Nitsch, of Bosall the propositions heretofore advanged for utilizing the atmosphere for purposes of transit as to command attention from the scientists and others to whom it has been presented. Instead of discharging the latter from their minds as visionary and impracticable, declares the Boston Post, several profound students have stopped and pondered upon it. couldn't it be made possible?" they ask themselves. "Why isn't it possible to use the enormous electric forces that play a mysterious, yet potent and important, part throughout the earth.

It is the idea of Mr. Nitsch that the subtle magnetic attraction that holds the needle of the mariner's compass with unswerving fidelity to the north can be utilized in a magnified form for man's convenience, profit and pleasure. Accept ing the theory advanced that vast deposits of magnetic ore exist in the immeare diate vicinity of the North Pole, and from there come the magnetic currents distributed over the globe, and it is the attraction of this thus far unbounded field that draws with magic power the needle of the compass, there is nothing. as Mr. Nitsch looks at it, to prevent its being made of real service.

"I believe," said he to a reporter, "that magnets could be suspended in the air of sufficient force to counteract the resistance of the air, overcome the adverse currents, and move more or less

rapidly towards the north." Here one of the largest magnets in ordinary use was introduced to illustrate the idea. The magnet was of two pounds weight and by its attraction the little cross sustained a considerable pull before KINGSTON & PEMBROKE giving way. The magnet itself figured as the magnetic ore deposits, and the bar as the air ship to be attracted.

"Now," continued the gentleman. 'let magnets enough be attached to a 1896 balloon to feel the force of the attraction near the North Pole, and the car would be drawn in that direction. If trials should prove the correctness of my opin ion, the problem of air navigation from south to north would be solved, and a great point would thereby be gained.

"The velocity of motion would prob ably be greater than that of the most powerful locomotive, but could be regu lated by the size and shape of the airship, which would have to carry the magnets, and the end of a voyage could be determined by lowering and using them as anchors.

"Aside from the possibility of reaching by these means in a very short time the magnetic ore deposits in the north, which would probably prove to be of great value, and accessible by land or water, and of reaching the North Pole itself, a mode of air navigation could thereby be established that would invariably guide the balloonist from the south to the north. We would thereby be enabled to carry mail and merchandise quicker than any railroad or steamship. "It would not surprise me if the mag

netic force would produce a velocity of much more than 100 miles an hour, at which rate we could carry tropical fruit in less than a day from Venezuela to New York or Boston, and distribute it by rail to points West.

"Valparaiso could land its goods in less than two days to points between the 40th and 50th degrees northern latitude; Lima and Panama products could be landed at points in North Carolina, Virginia, Pennsylvania and New York. Chicago could have its depots of transportation in Costa Rica, Nicaraugua, Honduras, Louisiana and along the Mississippi as far as St. Louis. Omaha could 8 Oct. "This mode of transportation would open immense fields for all Central and South American countries. It would remove the expensive and difficult transportation of the product from the inland plantations to railroads and seaports. "Enterprising North Americans would go south and cultivate on fertile soil such products as would pay them best; they would carry their harvest by balloon to home markets, and send the airship,

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
