



CHIPPEWA FALLS. The Relentless Flood is Crawling Up Inch By Inch-Many Buildings Have Been Abandoned-The Ice Gorge is Growing in Extent-The Western Storms.

CHIPPEWA FALLS, Wis., Dec. 2.—Anxiety Calendars and 'Xmas cards, Uglow & Co. fills every heart in this place, for the ice Among a number of Canadian patents gorge above the city is growing larger and more formidable every hour. Should it break the pent-up waters behind it would sweep the village from the earth. Enough water is escaping to drive the residents to a general scramble to remove household goods and merchandise to places of comparative safety.

The river attained a maximum height of twenty-three feet, and the business portion of the city has been abandoned. Large retail stores have moved their effects to places of safety, and over fifty stores restaurants, saloons and shops are flooded to the depth of three feet. The river continues to rise at the rate of two inches an hour, and ruin and devastation follow in the path of the waters. The river at this point is fully threequarters of a mile wide, and its surface is

covered with anchor ice to a depth from ten to thirty feet. The gorge continues to grow in extent It is now five miles long and in some places thirty to fifty feet high. It completely dams the river. At Flambeau farm, fifteen miles above this city, another gorge has formed. The river has overflowed its banks and inundated the country to the exter of twenty miles on either side.
