Enthusiasm and success go hand in hand, and the truth of this was more apparent than at the annual meeting of the Kingston reform association last evening in the Wain hall.

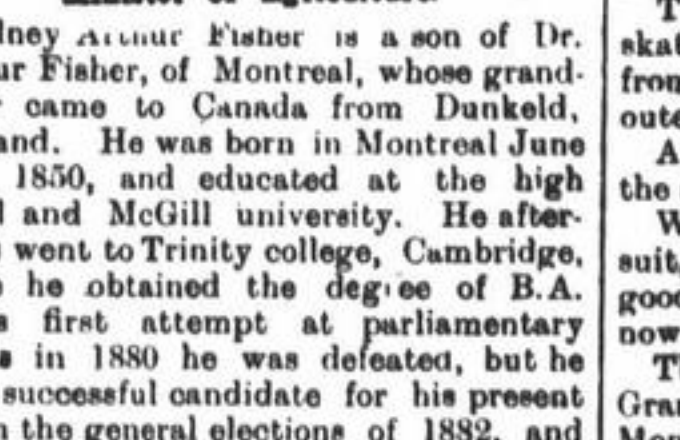

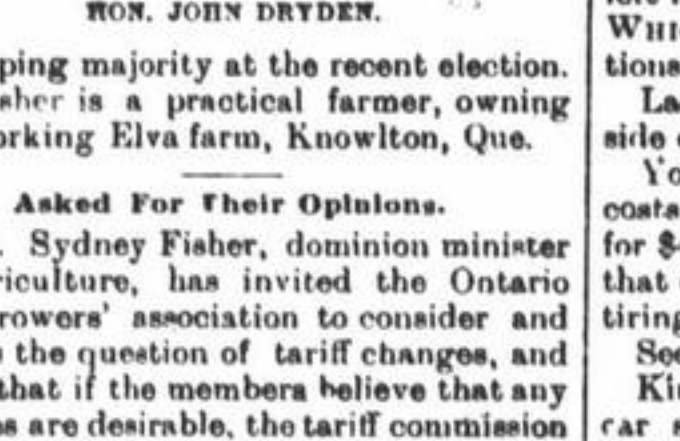
