WHAT JAMES DALY, KINGSTON, SAYS ON THE SUBJECT.

Midland District Well Adapted For Fruit Cultivation-Resources Should Be Developed-The Future of Fruit Growing -An Experimental Station Wanted. The following paper was read at the meeting of the Ontario fruit growers' association by James Daly, Kingston : Fruit growing in the midland districts n the past has been a series of experiments, many of which have been disastrous failures,

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
