SLAVERY IN CANADA.

Indians Were Kidnapped And Sold Into Slavery in Early Times. At the November session of the King ston historical society Dr. Neilson asked for information concerning the use of the word "Pawnee" in connection with slaves in Canada and the southern previnces early in the history of the continent. Old residents of Kingston who owned slaves had used the word, as documents they had left behind testified. At the meeting last evening Dr. Neilson answered his own uestion. In the interval he had looked the matter up and this is the explanation settlers in Louisiana found it difficult to permission from the French court to kidnap Indians from the remote west. Most of these captured Indians who were put into domestic use were Pawnees, hence the term came to be applied to slaves. Quite a number of these Indians were imported into Canada and it is almost certain some of them were owned by residents of this city. Difficulty was experienced in domesticating these Indian slaves, away from their masters, as they would
