ALIEN LABOR LAW. The fool legislators of the United States are again busy. They have introduced two bills into congress which are decidedly aimed at the Canadians. One is to the effect that it is unlawful for an alien, unless he becomes naturalized and has resided a year in the United States, to seek or accept employment in it, and for every violation of this law, which it is expected to become, there will be a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$500. Another bill aims at the limitation or restriction immigration to the best classes. To this end it provides that every male emigrant shall pay a duty of \$100, which shall be paid at the port of embarkation; that he shall be a man of character, able to read and write, and ready to renounce alle giance to his native land and become an American citizen. Neither may pass, and both may pass. In any case the inference is that U.S. congress is not inclined to modify the alien labor law, and that the Canadian commons will have, in defence of its people, to pass legislation protecting the | Kingston, Dunlop, King street. labor market from American encroachment. CORNWALL ELECTION.

The contest in Cornwall, for the possession of the seat held by the late Dr. Bergin in the commons, is exceedingly hot, and the appeal of the conservatives is to the religious prejudices of the people as a resuit of the Manitoba school compromise.

New York, Dec. 16,-Starving India's misery fills the reports just received by the Rev. Dr. James L. Barton, secretary of the foreign department of the American board missions, and the Rev. Dr. Elnathan E. Strong, its editorial secretary.

"From eighty missions in India," said Dr. Barton, "we have accounts of suffering beyond description. The severity of the famine does not indicate that there is no food in India, but that a scarcity in one section has raised prices beyond the earning power of the people. Wage earners there earn about a penny a day. On that they can live in ordinary times. Now, with the cost of food raised two or three fold, they cannot possibly live on their
