A CLERGYMAN DEAD.

Rev. A. M. Phillips of Douglas Methodist Church at Rest.

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—Rev. A. M Phil lips, pastor of Douglas Methodist church and one of the best known Methodist ministers in the country, died in Montreal last night. Mr. Phillips underwent an operation on Thursday last for renal calculus. The operation was entirely successful but complications ensued and the patient had only a few rational moments since. Deceased was born in Prince Edward county and educated in the public school years. He pursued his theological studies duated with the degree of B.D.S. in 1878. He acted as a local preacher for several years in the Sarnia and Oil Springs district. In 1875 he was received into full connection with the Methodist conference at Brantford, and in 1978 was ordained to the ministry. His first charge was at Chatham, whence he was transferred to St. Thomas, and later he occupied charges at Galt, Brampton and Toronto. In Toronto he was pastor of the Avenue road and Euclid avenue churches, respectively, and had hosts of friends. Simmons, electrician for the Kingston light, heat and power company, has invented an operatic arc lamp which promises to revolutionize electrical stageeffects. The new lamp is styled an operatic arc lamp, because it is intended chiefly for revolving on a ball joint. It can be used either on an alternating or continuous current from 800 to 3,000 candle power, focussing electric rays from a four foot radius to eighty foot area. It is compact and does not take up much room, being only fourteen inches high and seven inches wide.
