

Something New in Needlework.

A novel way of turning plush to account as a border for curtains or any large piece of work is described as follows: Cut the plush into stripe averaging five inches in width and join these strips neatly and strongly into a sufficient length, taking care that the pile falls all the same way. A design, and it should be a very bold one, must be traced on the wrong side of the plush, and all the material outside the design cut away, leaving only the open work pattern. This is to be laid quite flat on the curtain or other article to be ornamented, and kept in place by the help of a little, very little, embroidery paste. When this is quite dry, the raw edges of the plush are traced out with a line of narrow tingel cord, held in place by buttonhole stitches, which are carried far enough into the surface of the plush, and are close enough together to effectually prevent it from fraying. A second line of cord or of plain tinsel may be carried round beyond the other, should one not be considered sufficient. The rest of the plush may be filled in with a variety of fancy stitches worked in various colors and materials, or it may be left entirely plain, according to fancy. The plush in the latter case must exhibit a strong contrast of color or shade of color to that of the foundation material, or the work will give disappointment by not being sufficiently

An Old Mirror Made New. The pretty French mirror shown in the cut represents a useful style. By taking it as a model, a worn frame may be hidden and an old looking glass converted into something



FRENCH LOOKING GLASS. The draping blends plain plush or Roman heeting with either cretonne, art muslin, or again with figured silk, which is edged with a ball fringe. Trails of flowers are gracefully scattered over the soft folds, while a stuffed bird appears busily engaged chasing a bright butterfly painted on the mirror.

This wholesome dish can be had in perfection in summer, when milk sours and thickens very quickly, often without becoming acid in taste. It is a good plan to pour the milk, before it has thickened, into a glass dish, and when it is thick set it on the ice for an hour or two, or until meeded. It should always be served very cold, and care taken in dishing it that the curd is not broken any more than is absolutely necessary. It may be eaten with sugar and nutmeg.

Sheep's Kindeys with Wine. Clean and cut in small pieces. Melt a tablespoonful of butter, adding a teaspoonful of chopped parsley and one of mushrooms, a little salt, pepper and nutmeg. Stir the kidneys in this until they begin to harden, when dredge them with a little flour and a wineglass of white wine. Stir with a wooden spoon and simmer slowly till done. Take off and add a tablespoonful of butter and a tablespoonful of lemon juice.

Scorched Cream. The following is said to be very nice-to eat with ripe currants or any small fruit: Bring one quart of milk to a boil and stir in three eggs, six ounces of sugar and three tablespoonfuls of flour. Boil all together two or three minutes. Pour into a deep dish and sprinkle sugar over the top, and scorch with a very hot flat iron. To be eaten cold.

A Good Plain Pudding. One cupful of sugar mixed with three tablespoonfuls of melted butter, one well beaten egg, one pint of flour, one cup of sweet milk, one teaspoonful of soda and two teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar. Beat well and bake onehalf hour. To be eaten hot with sauce.

Nationality of Factory Employes. A recent announcement as to the national

ity of the employes of a cotton manufactur ing company illustrates the change which has taken place in the character of mill operatives in this country since manufacturing was in its infancy. In those days factory employes in such places as Manchester, Lowell, Lawrence and Worcester were recruited mostly from families in the country towns. So far from the lot of a mill operative being looked down upon, it was then considered honorable, and for a number of years native American girls made up the great body of the working force in the manufactories.

Gradually the foreign element was introduced, and as these people could live cheaper and consequently work for less wages, the native Americans, in the course of a few years, were nearly all displaced by foreigners. The French Canadians now form a large proportion of the employes in the mills of New England, though there are also many Scotch, English, Irish, French, German, and some Italian operatives. Of the Armory company's 800 employes, one-third are French Canadians and the rest are of various nationalities, only eighty, or one-tenth of the whole, being native Americans. What is true of this company is also substantially true of all the great manufacturing companies in New England. Nor is it necessary to go to the cities to see the change that several decades have wrought in the character of the factory population It may be seen in the smaller towns as well. The Puritan stock of New England, which has been the subject of so much pride among the native residents, is fast yielding to the flood of immigration from Europe and Canada.-New York Sun.

The Dog Was Not Consulted.

A curious medical experiment was made at Portland Me., during the session of the State Medical association. It was designed to illustrate a lecture by Dr. S. H. Weeks on the subject of "Penetrating Wounds of the Abdomen." A large coach cog, after being etherized, was shot by one of the Galens, who displayed much greater accuracy of aim than the average policeman shows in his pistol practice on rabid canines. The weapon was so leveled that the ball should pierce the intestines. After the wound had been inflicted, and while the animal was unconscious of the high honor done him, a quantity of carbonic acid gas was injected into the sys-

The point of interest was to ascertain what would become of the gas. If the intestines had been perforated the theory was that the gas would escape from the wound. If there was no escape by that outlet the presumption would be that the intestines had not been perforated. As is usual in such cases the operation was pronounced "a perfect success," although the sentiments of the dog are not reported. It is well to know of the result of this experiment, since any one who has reason to suppose that his abdominal domain has been rudely invaded by a knife or ball can settle the question for himself without incurring the expense of the services of a doctor.—Brooklyn Eagle.
