





The songs of the men are of such a character that they cannot have nor need any accompaniment, every line ending with a chorus, in which everybody joins, and at times fine harmony is rendered. At 2 o'clock a. m. everybody is feeling jolly; at 3 in a fighting mood; at o'clock only the sober ones are dancing, especially the lovers; at 5, as the first glimmer of dawn comes creeping over the mountains, the band winds up with the lovers' "danza," The last sweet words are whispered in the senorita's ear, and the company disperse for an hour's sleep.


