



A CONFIDENCE OPERATOR.

A So-Called Circus Agent Fails to Secure

VICTORIA, B. C., July 6 .- On Tuesday a young man giving the name of H. L. Vanderbilt, and describing himself as the contract ing agent for an immense circus which would exhibit in Victoria, introduced himself to the newspaper men of the city. He related a big story about the size of the show, which was represented to have 30 elephants and the proprietors to sail from Victoria for Australia on the steamship Nicaragua early in August. He was a little, dapper dude, closely shaven, with a light summer suit and white hat, and generally had the appearance of a lemonade vendor at a circus.
