#### VILLAGE OF DESERONTO.

A Town with Plenty of Life in It-Attractions Worth Seeing.

DESERONTO, July 10.—An eight year old son of Mr. Luke Murphy, of Deseronto, was drowned on Saturday. He had gone out on the logs either to fish or bathe and fell into the bay. Being missed a search was instituted, and the body recovered Saturday evening. The country in this section, as in South

Hastings, Lennox and Prince Edward, is suffering from the protracted drought. The hay crop is a failure, and other crops, even if rain should come, will not be one-third the average. It is noticeable, whether from calm despair or other reasons, that farmers do not grumble half as much as they did in seasons when both corn and wine did much more abound. The farmers are selling their cattle in anticipation of a shortage of feed. The situation for the majority of agriculturists is critical and must affect traders in Napanee, Picton, Belleville, and other towns and villages depending on the state of the crops.

The Orangemen of Deseronto to the number of forty, and their brethren of the Mohawk lodge, attended divine service on Sunday in the Mohawk church, where Rev. J. A. Anderson, the rector, preached an appropriate sermon suitable to the occasion. The action of the Quebec legislature, in the matter of the Jesuit estates, was vigorously denounced, and Orangemen urged to unite to prevent Roman aggression.

Two or three excursions a day pass the docks from Belle ville, Napanee, and other towns. Deseronto people are too busy to get off in the day time to a picnic or excursion, and content themselves with an evening sail. The masonic fraternity have their annual excursion to Glenora on Friday evening. Davy's Island and Glenora attract nearly all excursions from the bay district. It will take something more than a hotel with a coat of paint on it to attract excursionists to Massassaga, which is only a suburb of Bel'eville.

There is a great rush of visitors to our bay town this summer. As one of them remarked the other day, Deseronto is prettily situated, with beautiful drives and excursion routes, steamers calling every hour at the dock, and the visitors find something to see and learn by inspecting the different works with their machinery and novel productions of every kind.

Great repairs and improvement are in progress at the Deseronto flour mills, which are driven to their utmost capacity this season to supply the demand for their popular branches of flour.

#### ANOTHER DEFAULTER.

Flees From the States to Canada-He is Supposed to be in Montreal.

The record of the flight of trusted employees of banks in the States has been increased by another young man, who has fled from Jersey City and is supposed to be in Montreal. John H. Van Loan, a book-keeper in the second National bank of that city, has robbed the bank of \$14,000 and the deficit may reach \$20,000. The defaulter has been in the service of the institution about twelve years. He was placed in charge of the ledgers from "A to L" at a salary of \$2,000 a year.

The bank examiners paid a visit to the bank last Thursday. Van Loan's books were, of course, inspected. He should have been in the Catskill mountains enjoying his vacation, but was about the bank and exceedingly nervous. When the balance was struck and comparisons made his books showed a shortage of \$15,400. A clerical error was the verdict, and an 'I told you so' smile was worn by the officials when the footings of a column of figures revealed a mistake of \$1,000 in his favor. Other columns of figures but no more mistakes were discovered. Finally an account was reached which showed that the depositor had overdrawn over \$4,000. It was hoped that in this depositor's entries would be found the clerical errors. The examination was made and doubt ended as to the book-keeper's guilt. It contained a series of false entries, and created the impression that Van Loan had, with some one's aid, been systematically swindling the bank for a long time. The bank officers were not convinced that Van Loan was a defaulter until Sunday last, when they requested the Jersey City police to find the absent clerk and afford him a chance of explaining. They did not desire to prosecute him until thoroughly satisfied that he was not innocent. He could not be
