CONSERVATIVE REPUDIATION.

During the debate on the railway subsidies bill the conservatives in the Quebec legislature took a position the reverse of that held by them in the consideration of Dominion finances, Hon. Mr. Flynn protested against the addition of \$3,500,000 to the public debt on the ground that it would "constitute a great danger to the country." He went further and condemned "any policy that would add to the burdens of the people." Such, he declared, would not be poli. tically sound or prudent, and would in the end endanger the future of confederation. He was unnecessarily excited and out of accord with the party in the house of commons. It is of the new philosophy that a debt means nothing, that it does not matter how heavy it is on a country so long as its credit is good and its borrowing capacity is unlimited. It has been deemed a a tory in the dominion, so far as known, has seen fit to raise his voice in protest, to condemn the additions to the public debt and and ruination of the country. And there is some excuse for the action of the Mercier government. The policy of its predecessor had created certain wants which the province had to meet. The burdens are practically placed upon the people already, and a repudiation of them means a repudiation of the conservative party, which, in a sense, is eminently right and proper.



DAMAGE BY THE FRESHETS.

Too Much Water in Some Places-The Hardships of the People.

PITTSBURG, July 11.—The freshet in the Monongahela river is almost unprecedented and great damage has been done to the river craft and property all along the river from the head waters to this city. So far but one life has been reported lost, that of George | the Getter, who was struck by a parted cable and instantly killed. Polishtown, located along the bank of the Monongahela river, is in a sorry plight. There are nearly 78 everywhere shanty boats at that point, occupied by over 150 families. All of them, with the exception of about a dozen families, camped out last night. All Williamsburg, Beck's run, portions of McKeesport, California, Monongahela City, Belvernon, Brownsville, Fayette City and other towns along the river, are reported partially submerged. The water in some places is above the first floors of the houses, while piles of timbers, lumber and drifts in many cases are jammed against the doors, and windows at various points along the lines of the Pittsburg, Virginia and Charlestown, and the Baltimore &

TRYING TO SAVE MAXWELL.

The Plea of His Mother And Sister-Pleading Hard For Him.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., July 11 .- Mrs. Hannah Brooks and daughter, accompanied by O.W. Fauntleroy, Maxwell's attorney. arrived here yesterday. Mrs. Brooks and her daughter called upon Gov. Morehouse yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Brooks presented her plea in behalf of her son in a few words. She implored the governor to save her son's life, assuring him that he never killed Preller with murderous intent. -Mr. Fauntleroy presented a letter from Mr. Dickson, of England, Preller's former employer, which stated that Preller's parents were anxious that Maxwell's sentence be commuted, as they believed his execution would be the cause of the death of one or both of Maxwell's parents. The attorneys for Maxwell continued their plea to-day before the governor, who has asked for some further facts in the case, which will probably delay the final result until to morrow.
