



9. Tin pails only should be used.
10. All milk should be properly strained immediately after milking, and for that purpose a detached strainer is preferable to a strainer-pail.

11. In preparing milk for delivery to a cheese factory it should immediately after straining be thoroughly aired by pouring, dipping or stirring. This treatment is as beneficial for the morning's milk as for the evening's, and is even more necessary when the weather is cool than when it is

12. In warm weather all milk should be cooled after it has been aired but not be-

13. Milk kept over night in small quantities-say, in tin pails-will be in better condition than if kept in larger quantity in one vessel.


