In no other place will the merchant, for instance, be permitted to throw the sweepings of his store upon the street, and those representing civic authority should wake up and get some style about them. The street is not intended as a dumping-ground for all manner of rubbish, and the police, the city com. missioner, and even the mayor and aldermen should note who are violators of the bylaw and have the magistrate attend to them. Let examples be made of a few of the offenders and the nuisance now complained off will be ended.

"What is the Ontario farmer's position now in the dried up districts?" he asks. "It is this : He finds that he has but very little on his farm as the fruit of his season's labour. He is not to blame for this; he has worked faithfully. The government is not to blame for it. He also finds that he must procure feed for his stock, and food for his family, or they will starve. Failing to raise them himself in the face of nature's withering frown, he must have hay, and oats, and corn, and other necessaries, but he cannot get them at a reasonable price. For this | favour. And it did to the extent of a sit the government is to blame. The drought is not universal. The famine is local. These necessaries of life for man and beast exist in abundance near our doors, with our neighbours, who would be glad to sell to us, but we are not permitted to buy, unless we consent with every purchase we make to also drop a contribution into the coffers of some protege of the government who has no claim upon us, and who needs it a hundred times less then we. We must either pay these pensions and tariff prices or dispose of the stock at other ruinous tariff prices. Thus it is that the Ontario farmer is at present 'between the devil and the deep sea,' and he asks the goverment to rout the tariff. devil. He must have hay, oats, and corn to winter his stock, and he asks the government to take the duty from these articles, and thus assist him in reaching them. #### USES OF ELECTRICITY.

It is astonishing to what use, electricity is now being put. In the matter of lighting the preference for electricity is particularly marked. This is no doubt due to the fact that it does not consume the oxygen, or air, and does not viciate it, and does not produce any carbonic acid. It has, says a writer to the North American Review, not only sold at a profit in direct competition with the cheapest gas, but it has tended to equalize the economic conditions.

Previous to 1879 the public knew of electric lamps only by name, "and with that year," says Thomas Commerford Martin, "begins the present period of electrical engineering which will be a notable and mark. ed feature of the last part of the nineteenth century. Up to that time, save in electroplating, large currents were beyond the skill

night scores of huge central stations throw on their wire currents representing as much as 1,500 horse power, as well as illustrating on a gigantic scale the correlation of forces | The Way the Parnell Affair is Said to Have and the conservation of energy." The capital invested in the United States, in the manufacture of electric lighting apparatus, and the scale of electric light, locally, is already equal to that of telegraphy and telephony together, reaching over \$150,000,000. A thousand lighting companies and over 3,000 private plants have in operation about 300,000 are lights and 2,000,000 incandes cents. And the work is only in its inception. "Noteworthy, too," observes Mr. Marton, 'is the change of front on the part of the gas companies, over one hundred of which have come to the conclusion that they can sell just as well as calico, and have equipped to fill the demand for the new style of goods." Moreover the prediction is made that five years hence the percentage of horse-power gained will be such that 8,000,000 people and upwards, and to supply them will require an output of 11,000 lamps, and of 1,000 horse power of boilers, engines and dynamo-electric machines, every working day from now until 1892. Such a result looks impossible, but Mr. Martin contends that the gain in 1887 justified the sober acceptance of the

calculation. For propelling purposes perhaps more than for lighting purposes, the electri motor will, in future, be in demand. The electric railway is still a novelty, and yet we are told that there are twenty-three such roads in operation, carrying passengers at the rate of between five and ten millions annually, that fifteen more are in course of construction, that contracts for twenty more have been let, and that many are prospected. These railways are cleaner, more economical, and safer. Out of 120,000 horses engaged on street railways it is esti. mated that 20,000 become useless annually. Electricity is cheaper than animal power by from 30 to 50 per cent. The conduit and battery method is cheaper than the cable by from 10 to 20 per cent. "Steam, though becoming more and more objectionable for motive purposes, may, however, enjoy a monopoly on the large railways indefinitely." This is the opinion of Mr. Marten again, and he has written enough to convince any one that he is a shrewd and careful observer. He does not deal with the prophecies that have been made by scientific men that within ten years the locomotive will be dispensed with and each passenger and freight car supplied with its own motive electrical force, which will be easily stored and easily applied. Ten years is a short time for the revolution to set on, but there is nothing astounding in the calculation in view of what has been accomplished in the same direction during the last ten years.
